

Annual expenditure highlights _

On January 25th the Council agreed its annual budget for 2022/23. The Council expenditure reflects our commitment to Marlow town and its residents to continue with the high-quality services and events we currently provide, operate and maintain. We thought we would highlight some of the key areas of expenditure we incur as we continue to provide an excellent level of service.

Grounds maintenance

We don't own all the public land in Marlow (most is owned by Buckinghamshire Council) - however, under devolved powers, we manage the ground maintenance of all our town land in order to maintain a consistent appearance and a high standard. A new ground maintenance contract has been tendered as our old contract was expiring. During our selection process for a contractor, we not only examined like-for-like costs, we also took into consideration other environmental and sustainability criteria such as use of electric tools and vehicles instead of diesel.

In order to maintain the level of service, our budget has had to be increased — all three companies shortlisted in the tender process submitting more expensive bids. The grass cutting service we oversee covers the whole town for eight cuttings a year at a projected cost of $\mathfrak{L}75,000$ per year.

On 1st April 2022 John O'Conner (Grounds Maintenance) Ltd will begin a three-year contract with Marlow Town Council for grounds maintenance of the Council owned areas of land in Marlow. The contract will last for three years with an option to extend. The main duties are verge grass cutting, parks grass (except Higginson Park which is owned and managed by Buckinghamshire Council), the town cemetery and shrub beds. Marlow Town Council is in the excellent position of having eight verge cuts per year, more than double some areas in Buckinghamshire.

Public spaces

We choose to maintain our public spaces by working with the Community Payback programme. The service provides us with minor offenders who are supervised and tasked with maintenance requests. This partnership enables us to have better maintenance response and coverage while giving back to our local community. This maintenance service costs $\mathfrak{L}6,000$ per year.

Throughout the pandemic Marlow Town Council have been lucky enough to maintain a productive relationship with the Thames Valley Rehabilitation Service and have a Community Payback group visit Marlow most Tuesdays.



A supervisor from the Services works with the group at areas assigned by the Council. The group always work hard and contributes to the upkeep of the town. The principal duties are cutting back alleyway overgrowth, sweeping leaves from paths and edging out overgrown pathways.

Security services

Our Police Community Support Officers provide another level of support for our community in addition to the police. For many years the Council has enhanced the security of our town through sharing the cost of an additional Police Community Support Officer, 50% of whose time is dedicated to Marlow (subject to operational requirements). We know that residents are pleased to see this additional resource patrolling on a regular basis throughout the town. We will continue to support this role, the cost for which is £19,125 per year.

Additionally, for the past two years the Council has hired and paid for a private security firm to help keep our town safe. Since it started, the security coverage has been expanded to include more spaces and the number of patrols has increased. These patrols visit our parks and green spaces on a regular basis, dealing with anti-social behaviour and minor crime and they work closely with the police. This Council-funded programme has been so successful with residents that we are now adding it as a permanent service for our town — the cost coming from our annual budget. The cost of this service is £27,372 per year. It was previously funded from reserves.

Transportation services

Marlow town bus operates on weekdays in and around the town centre and to and from Maidenhead and High Wycombe. It is run by Buckinghamshire Council and to support this important service we pay Bucks £6,300 per year.

If you leave the car at home for that trip to the shops, to the park or to work, you can help reduce congestion and improve air quality at the same time. The bus stops in many places around the town and has links to Maidenhead and High Wycombe.

A professional publisher handles the design and print. The Marlovian publishing costs £6,400 per year.

We offer grants each year to our town's groups and associations to help them achieve their ambitions and make Marlow a better place for us all. If you wish to apply for a grant, the forms are available on the website **https://www.marlow-tc.gov.uk/grants/** - we provide grants totalling £8,000 per year.

We will continue to support and celebrate important events in our town and give our residents something to look forward to. Elsewhere in this Marlovian we outline our plans to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in June.

As detailed in our last issue of the Marlovian, we make Marlow a great place to be during the Christmas period, with our enhanced Christmas lights, decorations and Carols on The Causeway. To maintain these to a high standard, we have a budgeted cost of $\mathfrak{L}11,600$.

We hope you like this snapshot of our budget for 2022/23, which costs the average band D Council Tax property (the standard Government measure) £55.25 per year, just over £1 per week. If you would like any further information on the Council's finances, please contact the town council office.

Fix my Street

Buckinghamshire Council is responsible for these issues, which can all be reported online. You will receive an immediate email acknowledgement of your issue, a follow-up report with a timescale to fix the issue and finally an email when the problem is resolved. The system is simple and easy to use, and you can choose not to have your name shown publicly. You can also see on their interactive map all the other problems that have been logged locally.

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Business Lasting Powers of Attorney

What are they?

Most people are aware of Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs). These are legal documents which allow an individual or individuals referred to as your attorneys to manage your affairs. You can appoint your attorneys to either manage your 'Property and Financial' or 'Health and Welfare' affairs.

A Business LPA is a useful document which allows a business owner to appoint an attorney or attorneys to make decisions in the best interests of the organisation should the owner become mentally incapacitated, is abroad on holiday or business or has had an accident and does not have the capabilities to make a decision.

Business Lasting Powers of Attorney can be useful for business either as Sole Traders, Limited Liability Partnerships, Traditional Partnerships and Directors.

What do they do?

The Business LPA would allow the appointed individuals or individuals to make decisions such as authorising the payment of invoices, signing company cheques, instructing employees to perform key tasks, employing new members of staff and dealing with the daily business activities.

Who should I appoint?

It is advisable that the attorney is familiar with the business and is someone who can be entrusted with the affairs of the business. The attorney should be someone who is confident, trustworthy, competent, reliable and can undertake the tasks to manage the business in the absence of the owner.

In the best interests of the business it may be pertinent to appoint two attorneysone to deal with the dealings / everyday activities of the business (e.g. business accountant or employee) and the other attorney who deals with the personal financial issues (e.g. a member of the family).

The Implications of not preparing a business Lasting Power of Attorney

If there is no business lasting powers of attorney in place, this could prove to be extremely detrimental to the business. If this is the case and there is an absence of a business lasting power of attorney, an application would need to made and submitted to the Court of Protection which is time consuming and expensive. During this period, the business may suffer with no one in person to manage the daily affairs.



Marlovians ready for a green future!



The randomised and weighted survey was carried out in late 2021. It found that residents considered environment and climate change to be the second most important local issue for Marlow. Only health was deemed more important, probably reflecting high concern over Covid at the time.

The survey reveals many ways in which Marlow residents want to do more for the environment. It also highlights sustainable behaviours they already engage in.

Nearly 60% of survey respondents expressed interest in switching to an electric vehicle. Electric vehicles produce zero exhaust emissions so they are an important way that households can cut their contribution to both air pollution and climate change. The Marlow Environmental Performance Index, published by the Council, shows that Marlow is already a leader in electric vehicle ownership.

Close behind electric vehicles, 55% of respondents said they would like to fit solar panels on their home. Solar is a valuable source of zero carbon electricity. Installing panels plus a storage battery can enable households to reduce exposure to rocketing retail electricity prices.

Just under half of respondents said they would like to measure their personal carbon footprint. This shows a widespread awareness both of climate change as an issue and of the importance of lifestyle choices in influencing emissions.

The same proportion said they would like to switch their home heating from natural gas to an electric heat pump. Heat pumps are still not common in Britain, but gas heating is one of the biggest ways that most households contribute to global warming, alongside personal transport and diet, so this is an important finding.

Substantial numbers of residents are interested in embracing other sustainable behaviours too. Over onethird of respondents said they would like to grow their own food; one-third want to cycle more.

When it comes to what Marlovians already do for the environment, the most common sustainable behaviour is waste recycling, which nearly 90% of respondents already do. Four in five respondents said they already

walk more, and three-quarters said they have reduced use of plastic.

Over half said they have fitted energy-saving lighting and appliances in their homes, and about half said they are flying less and eating less meat and dairy - the types of food with the highest global warming impact.

The survey also reveals that Marlow residents' top priority for council action on the environment is better management of waste. Illegal fly tipping emerged as residents' top concern, followed closely by more action to improve waste recycling, and then to control litter better. Waste management is primarily a county responsibility. But the Town Council takes a close interest, particularly around issues of littering.

Residents were supportive of more school children walking or cycling to school; the motorised school run is currently a significant contributor to traffic congestion and poor air quality in Marlow. Reducing air pollution was another, related priority.


Actions to make Marlow a greener, leafier town also got a thumbs up from respondents, who said they wanted more of the wildflower verges that the Town Council has started planting around the town, more roadside trees, and improvements to Marlow's parks.

The survey was carried out using professional polling techniques to make the responses as representative as possible of Marlow's population. People were selected at random to be invited to participate and were not pre-warned of the survey topic. Polling firm Opinium supported the analysis. It advised that the sample of 195 responses received was of good quality, and "weighted" the answers to Marlow's true population by age group, sex and area.

THE SUSTAINABLE BEHAVIOURS MARLOVIANS DO AND WANT TO DO



What next for a more sustainable Marlow?

Marlow Town Council sees its detailed survey of Marlovians on environmental issues as being just the beginning of a new push to make Marlow more sustainable. The council now wants to work with the whole community to encourage and celebrate more sustainable behaviours by residents.

Why the focus on residents and their lifestyles? Simply because it really matters. Decarbonising Britain entirely by 2050 is going to require big interventions by the government and large companies, to be sure. But every individual, every household and every community must also play its part. Some simple statistics demonstrate this very clearly.

Surface transport is the UK's largest source of greenhouse gas emissions, and the most important component of this is not lorries, nor trains, but private road vehicles. Home energy use - largely gas central heating - accounts for 14% of national carbon emissions. What we eat accounts for a quarter of household contribution to climate change when embedded emissions are also counted.

The Marlow Environmental Performance Index, first published in February 2021 and available on the council's website, shows that some types of environmental pressures are particularly large in our area, meaning even more need for as many people as possible to start making changes. The Index reports that the average Marlow resident uses considerably more gas, electricity and water than the national average, and that cars registered locally have on average higher CO2 emissions than across the country. Due to these and other factors,

per-household carbon emissions are much higher in Marlow than the national average.

Moreover, while more technology development still needs to happen, there are already many ways that anybody can start changing behaviours now to support sustainability. As this edition of the Marlovian went to press the council was putting the finishing touches to new initiatives designed to encourage and support residents to adopt greener behaviours, building on a sustainability consultation event it organised in March 2021.

These include the creation of a regular gathering for residents concerned about sustainability to discuss issues with each other and the council. Plus a Sustainable Marlow Challenge programme of information and support to the whole Marlow community to adopt more sustainable behaviours. Town welcomes new street trees

An unprecedented number of new street trees appeared in Marlow this winter, thanks to government funding. About 60 saplings were due to be planted at multiple locations, mainly to the east and north sides of Marlow.

The new trees will add beauty to the town, as well as providing multiple environmental benefits, including wildlife habitat, absorbing air pollution, reducing flooding and providing shade in summer.

The new trees, worth thousands of pounds, arrived thanks to a successful bid by Buckinghamshire Council to the government's Local Authority Treescapes Fund. All final decisions over siting and species were taken

by Buckinghamshire's roads agency, Transport for Buckinghamshire.

Marlow was included in the programme thanks to community trees group Releaf Marlow, which is run by Transition Town Marlow and supported by the town council. The group recommended sites to be included in Buckinghamshire's bid, based on resident requests as well as its own views and those of the town council.

Planting began just as the Marlovian went to press. Streets where the new trees can be seen include Bobmore Lane at its junction with Little Marlow Rd, Wiltshire Rd, again near Little Marlow Road, and the green space between Marlow and Marlow Bottom on Wycombe Rd. An extensive selection of tree species were due to feature in the new planting, including midland hawthorn, Swedish whitebeam, red-leaved hazel, birch, sweet gum, tulip tree and lime.

The town council is supportive of continuing tree planting efforts in future. In particular it will be working with Transition Town Marlow, whose Releaf Marlow project has been awarded £7,000 by Buckinghamshire Council towards new trees to be planted in winter 2022/23. Popular street market expands

Marlow's artisan, local food market has doubled its presence to twice-monthly. As many as 3,000 people now visit each market, making it an important part of the town's social calendar and increasingly important to the local economy. From February, the outdoor market now runs on every 3rd as well as every 1st Saturday of each month, open from 10am to 3pm on The Causeway, near All Saints Church.





Local community group Transition Town Marlow (TTM) organises the market with the aims of bringing together the community and supporting local and sustainable producers. The group requires products to be made within 30 miles of Marlow and stallholders to avoid plastic packaging as far as possible.

The market has quickly established itself since 2017, with marked increases in numbers of both stalls and visitors. Products now regularly on sale include local cheeses, meats, charcuterie, cakes, bread, pies, herbal teas, honey, rapeseed oil, gin, wine, granola and even dog biscuits. Other regular stalls offer hot takeaway foods, including paella, Thai food and pancakes.

Every market is organised mainly by TTM volunteers. This involved considerable extra effort during the pandemic to make the market Covid-secure in line with safety requirements. Buckinghamshire Council provides the required road closure permit, and the town council lends its safety barriers.

Lead market organiser Liz Lorente of TTM expressed pleasure at the expansion, saying she hoped it would become an even bigger beacon for local sustainability and a strong community. Marlow's deputy mayor Jocelyn Towns also welcomed the additional market days and paid tribute to the TTM volunteers who make it happen.



Join forces for the Thames Valley Clean Up on 7th & 8th May

The Rotary Club of Marlow Bridge has for some while been holding litter picks in our beautiful town, but we have to give credit to the Marlow Wombles who probably do the lions share along with other groups. Do the groups doing such sterling work to keep our majestic river

environment clean receive the publicity or acclaim that

they deserve?

Rotary Clubs throughout the Thames Valley have a plan – if Rotary and all of the other environmental groups across the Rotary District, which stretches from Uxbridge in the East to Farringdon in the West, were to come together the event would be newsworthy hopefully at a national level

Clearing rubbish out of the Thames and its tributaries is fantastic, but do people know who is doing it and why and more to the point will they change their habits and attitudes? It might seem funny to see a swan nesting in a bed of rubbish but not so when plastic waste gets caught on their necks or feet, even worse when ingested plastic kills birds and fish and other wild life.

With a co-ordinated effort, we can collect debris both from the water and surrounding land and if we do this over much of the Thames Valley, it will attract massive publicity and maybe encourage people to dispose of their trash in an environmentally friendly way – yes we will need help. We already have some volunteers and offers of boats, and are currently talking to the other environmentally interested groups. We always need more volunteers, we are confident this project will be a massive success.

We needed to know, before embarking on an exercise of this magnitude, what to expect, so in October we ran a pilot litter pick in the Henley / Sonning area. We prepared well talking to Oxfordshire CC, the Environment Agency (EA) and Thames Rescue. They liked the project and gave us full support. The EA are now asking us for promotional material that they can put out on their website. We will also be talking to Bucks and Berks.

We learnt a lot from the pilot and have built an interactive website at **www.environment.thamesvalleyrotary. info** This is a Rotary website, but the advice and relevant downloads are available to any organisations who want to help. The three Rotary Clubs in Marlow are fully behind the project and support from the District is strong from both Rotary and other organisations. We must make this project a success. 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Talking Newspaper

Expanding listeners to the 'Talking Newspaper'

Just imagine if you were blind, partially sighted, or had a reading disability, or suffered with Parkinson's Disease or Alzheimer's - how would you find out what's going on in your district? There is an amazing service that would help. The local branch of the Talking Newspaper is actively looking to expand its listener base. Wycombe Talking Newspaper (WTN) provides weekly news about Marlow, Princes Risborough and Wycombe. WTN is a free service.



Every Friday evening volunteers select interesting local news items from the Bucks Free Press, which are recorded on to memory sticks in the WTN premises in Hampden Road. Over the weekend these sticks are sent in postal wallets to our listeners so that they can play them in their memory

stick players (Boomboxes). Boomboxes are specifically designed for simple operation. After use the memory sticks are returned to us for re-use. Listeners don't need to write anything on the wallet labels before posting them back; they are pre-addressed.

Everything is free – memory sticks, wallets, postage and Boomboxes. WTN is grateful to its donors for the support that makes this possible.

The weekly news items are also placed on the internet **www.wycombetalkingnewspaper.org.uk** each weekend; this provides an alternative method for our listeners to keep up to date with local news.

arlow Community Association was set up in May 1967 with Liston Hall kindly donated by Mrs Nesta Liston as the facility to bring together groups and individuals who offer mutual support and friendship to the community. First used as a Methodist Church in 1874, it has had a colourful life since ceasing to be a church. It has been a county library, Labour Exchange, dance hall, theatre, Weights and Measure Inspection Centre, clinic and finally in 1970, home of the Marlow Community Association (MCA). As a registered charity it relies on the regular use of its rooms to generate income to maintain and improve the facilities. The hall is located close to the High Street and benefits from having Liston Road car park right next door. With a range of versatile rooms for hire, it's perfect for a one-off occasion, repeat bookings such as Yoga, Pilates, educational classes, business meetings and more.

 The Thames Room is to the rear of the main hall, making it ideal for meetings, classes, or small children's parties. With its own private entrance, small kitchen and toilet, it can accommodate up to 50 people* with stacking tables and chairs available.

- The Garden Room is a lovely bright room that overlooks our garden at the front of the building, with carpets and curtains, making it perfect for slide shows or movies. The room holds up to 40 people,* is suitable for smaller functions, lunches and meetings and is popular with card players, especially bridge clubs. There are tables and cushioned chairs and a hatch to the kitchen and the room has disabled access.
- The Main Hall is our largest room and is used for a variety of events including weddings, parties, large meetings, open days, company promotions, sales, shows, classes and more. It's a big space a bouncy castle can fit inside! It can accommodate up to 200 people* or 175 people* seated in theatre style, with a hatch to the kitchen and disabled access.

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Social Prescribing Day

The Arc PCN (Primary Care Network) Social Prescribing team

Social Prescribing is part of the NHS five-year plan which began in 2019, focusing on individuals that may need a little help and support in developing what matters to them to achieve desired goals.



Social Prescribers work within a Primary Care Network. Primary Care Networks consist of groups of GP practices working closely together to provide joined up care, one-to-one support linking individuals to community services, delivering personalised care focusing on what matters to the person.

The ARC PCN comprises six Bucks GP practices collaboratively working together:

- The Simpson Centre and Penn Surgery
- Millbarn Medical Centre
- Bourne End and Wooburn Green Medical Centre
- Highfield Surgery
- Cherrymead Surgery
- Marlow Medical Group

Social Prescribers also use local organisations and community assets to grow local groups to connect like-minded individuals to participate in local activities to increase overall physical and mental wellbeing.

We have been sourcing areas of activity that are operating in the local area, including newly developed groups that would benefit our community. This 'Directory of Services' provides us with a map of all that is on offer and reveals any areas of support that might be missing or could be expanded.

The Arc PCN run regular Talking Café's which invite individuals to talk about what matters to them, meet new people and have positive conversations focusing on what is strong, not what is wrong, and chat to a Community Connector/Social Prescriber about activities, support groups and services in your community.

Sometimes it can also be a reason to reach out for further advice from our team which can facilitate a referral for a person-centred based one-to-one conversation with their social prescribing team should a need be more private than the café allows.

She and her group of ladies in "Marlow Poppies" have crocheted thousands of poppies, creating a magnificent display around All Saints' Church and Higginson Park railings during the Poppy Appeal period. She also produced poppies commemorating individual soldiers who fell in conflict. She and her team raised over £2,000 for the Poppy Appeal in Marlow.









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Marlow Museum

Landmark Medieval Commemoration Day

unday, 28th November marked a historic occasion in the history of Marlow Museum - over a decade since its inauguration. The Marlow Museum Centre project took the bold step of taking its history to the people of Marlow as the customers of the Duke of Clarence pub in the High Street were treated to a day of medieval history and experiences. Several of the town's societies and institutions were represented and an opening ceremony was headed by Town Mayor, Cllr. Richard Scott, accompanied by the Mayoress, Mrs. Linda Scott.

28th November, 1499 was the date when Edward Plantagenet, 17th Earl of Warwick, was executed, privately, at the Tower of London. His head and body were taken to Bisham Abbey and buried in the grounds. With the Dissolution of the Monasteries, under Henry VIII's orders, much of the Abbey was destroyed. The exact location of Edward's remains is rumoured to be beneath where the tennis courts are situated today. Edward's father, George Plantagenet, 1st Duke of Clarence, was reputed by Shakespeare to have met his end in a butt of Malmsey wine in the Bowyer Tower on 18th February 1478. This scenario is depicted in three large-framed prints displayed at the rear of the Duke of Clarence pub.

The Medieval Commemoration Day proved to be a notable success with visits from several members of the key societies in the town, along with tourists from as far afield as Chile, Turkey, the Czech Republic, Lebanon and Japan. Much interest focused around the displays by MotherFibre's Leah Barnes' ecological clothing, Ann Hilton's demonstration of hand loom weaving and Gareth Griffiths in his impressive re-enactment knight's uniform alongside promotions by Dementia Action for Marlow and Mary Does Marlow. All this, along with music recordings from medieval singers and musicians, made for an enjoyable day and introduced the work of the museum to a whole new audience with encouraging merchandise sales.

The commemoration would not have been possible without the diligent cooperation of the pub Events Manager, Amy Pyle and General Manager, Emily Davies. The overall feeling amongst those in attendance was that it deserves to become an annual event.

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
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Santa's Fun Run 2021

Charities and good causes to receive around £47,000



Much of the money is already on its way to the charities concerned. As an example, the 2021 lead charities (Thames Valley Air Ambulance (TVAA) and Young Minds) will share nearly £7,000 from entry fees. In addition TVAA raised a four-figure sum as a team of supporters entered the run and secured additional sponsorship.

Also, and for the first time, the organisers introduced a special £5000 "Charity Pool", made possible by the generous support of the Shanly Foundation, Blaser Mills Law, Heart of Bucks Foundation and Community Impact Bucks. The money has now been shared by 11 charities where teams of supporters entered and met the award criteria.

Together with their own team sponsorship efforts, these charities have collectively received in excess of £22,000 as a result of the event. (The charities benefiting were Macmillan Cancer Support, Vales House Dementia Care, War Child, Thames Valley Air Ambulance, Marlow Opportunity Playgroup, Bookmark, MS Society, Lighthouse Central, 11th High Wycombe Scouts, and the Heart of Bucks Foundation).

A number of heart-warming stories lie behind these fantastic efforts:

Florence Cox, (aged 8), and her dad entered the Fun Run because she wanted to raise money for a good cause. Florence chose War Child - which seeks to help children experiencing the horrors of being trapped in wartorn countries. With the support of friends, family and local residents, Florence herself raised



more than £1,200. The Fun Run Charity Pool was able to top this up by around £500 to nearly £1,700. James Cox, Florence's dad, said: "This is a fantastic event for both families and charities. Florence wanted to enter and help others - and we are so proud of what she achieved. We had great fun at the same time as managing to do

something for those a little less fortunate than ourselves."

Rebecca Hatch organised teams raising funds for the High Wycombe 11th Scout Group. The teams raised over $\mathfrak{L}1,500$, which the Fun Run Charity Pool was able to top up to around $\mathfrak{L}2,000$. Rebecca said: "Covid-19 has limited what we can do to raise funds for the Scout Group - so this was a fantastic opportunity. We are delighted to have raised so much - and of course the teams had great fun doing it. The idea of the Charity Pool really made a difference and to receive the extra money was a bonus. The Scout Group can do a lot with $\mathfrak{L}2,000$!"



In addition to the funds so far allocated, the Rotary Clubs of Marlow expect to distribute almost $\mathfrak{L}18,000$ more of the Santa's' Fun Run proceeds to local good causes over the coming months.

John Prout, Chair of the Marlow Santa's Fun Run Organising Committee, said "We are absolutely delighted with the amount of money raised – and yet again the event has been a huge success. Every year we try to add a new element, and in 2021 the creation of the £5,000 Charity Pool really made a big difference. Every year this event should register locally as a key opportunity for charities and their supporters to raise additional funds. We will try very hard to make the 2022 Run just as much fun, and in particular will seek to make the Charity Pool even more attractive. The local Rotary Clubs are pretty good at raising money – our task now is to transfer this money to the deserving charities who are the real experts in their field."

The date for the 2022 event is confirmed as Sunday, 4th December, and the website for entries will open on 1st September 2022. John added: "The event is now a key part of the local calendar, and really does seem to retain its appeal despite all that Covid can throw at it. Again a big thanks to all concerned."



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


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
