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

#### Town vision



# Town Council News



### New night time security patrols are being introduced in Higginson Park

Marlow Town Council (MTC) has stepped in to fund nighttime security patrols in Higginson Park, extending the successful scheme introduced last year in Seymour and Gossmore Parks.

Higginson Park is managed by Wycombe District Council but their Green Spaces team were not able to fund the extended patrols. Marlow Town Council has agreed to pay for a trial period of six months from January 2020.

The highly visible patrols will be a deterrent to crime as well as deterring anti-social behaviour

The licensed security operatives will share all intelligence with the police and gather additional surveillance material.

These patrols have been running since August 2019 in Seymour and Gossmore Parks with highly trained officers from 4Front security patrolling twice every night of the year. Both these parks have seen a significant reduction in crime and anti-social behaviour, and we are anticipating that Higginson Park will see a similar success.



#### Carols on The Causeway in December

Marlow Town Council officers had to set up Father Christmas's Grotto and the gazebo for the Carols on The Causeway event last December in the most appalling conditions – torrential rain, thunder and lightning. We thought the evening would be a complete wash-out but Marlovians are a tough bunch and came out in hundreds to support the event. Thank you Marlovians!

Our special thanks must go to: the Town Band for staying with us by sheltering under the gazebo during the storm; members of Marlow Choral Society; Robyn from Bill's Restaurant who was giving out free hot chocolate; and the Rotary Club for handing out the free mulled wine generously donated by The George and Dragon. Sainsbury's kindly donated mince pies.

Father Christmas was in his cosy "living room" asking children what they wanted for Christmas and handing them a bag of chocolates and some sleigh bells provided by Marlow Town Council. MTC also handed out free battery candles to the crowd.

Thankfully conditions eased enough for everyone to enjoy the carol singing led by Mayor Richard Scott.



### No increase in Council Tax for Marlow residents for the third year running\_\_\_\_\_

At the January Town Council meeting Councillors agreed to keep Band D Tax at £51.24. This is the third year running that the Council has made no increase in its Council tax request. This is possible because of continuing prudent expenditure and negotiation of contracts. The budget from April 2020 was also set at this meeting and for the first time in recent years a deficit budget was set, with any shortfall being taken from reserves.

Found a pothole? Blocked drain in the road? Damage to kerbs and pavements? Streetlight not working? Did you know that the easiest and quickest way to get any of these problems fixed is by reporting it online? Bucks County Council is responsible for these issues, which can all be reported online. You will receive an immediate email acknowledgement of your issue, a follow-up report with a timescale to fix the issue and finally an email when the problem is resolved. The system is simple and easy to use, and you can choose not to have your name shown publicly. You can also see on their interactive map all the other problems that have been logged locally.

#### Going Wild

Marlow Town Council are going to trial growing wildflowers along some roadside grass verges in Marlow this year. This is with the aim of developing and supporting wildlife and its natural habitat. There has been an increasing interest nationwide in supporting the growth of environmentally beneficial plants along roadsides. This project is advocated by #sustainablemarlow which is a working group with the objective of making Marlow into an environmental exemplar town with a series of projects tackling climate change and other priority issues. The chosen verges will have a sign in the patch or nearby to explain that they are being left uncut to grow native wildflowers. This initiative has also been supported by WildMarlow and Transition Town Marlow.

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# Could You Be A Councillor?

Local elections will take place in May 2020



## be a COUNCILLOR

ould you like to serve your community, influence local decision-making and really make a difference? If so, why not consider standing as a Councillor in the May 2020 local elections?

There are roughly 20,000 local councillors in England. Councillors are elected to the local council to represent their own local community, so they must either live or work in the area.

Each councillor has their own reasons for running but the role offers the chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life for people in your local area.

Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work. Councillors have to balance the needs and interests of residents, the political party they represent (if any) and the council. The councillor's role centres around community leadership and engagement.

Responsibilities include:

- representing the ward for which they are elected
- decision-making developing and reviewing council policy
- scrutinising decisions taken by the councillors regulatory, quasi-judicial and statutory duties

#### How can I get involved?

Once you've decided to get involved and stand as a councillor there are two main routes; you can decide to stand for one of the political parties/groups or as an independent.

#### Representing a political party

If you want to represent a political party, then get involved with your party locally as soon as possible. They will advise on what is involved and ultimately select a candidate.

#### Standing as an independent candidate

If you're thinking of standing as an independent candidate, you can contact your council's electoral services department. You will need to start becoming aware of issues in your local area, what your local council is doing about these issues, and how your own opinion differs from the political parties. Each councillor has their own reasons for running but the role offers the chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life for people in your local area

#### Getting officially nominated

Whether you've been selected by a party or are standing as an independent candidate, you must make sure that you are officially nominated as the election date draws nearer.

This means getting 10 people to sign your nomination papers, (signatories must be registered electors in the ward where you wish to stand) available from your local council's democratic services department. Contact Wycombe District Council Electoral services department.


You must also give your consent in writing to your nomination. All the necessary documents must be submitted 19 working days before the day of the election.

#### Update on Town Council environmental initiative



#### Help Marlow's Air Pollution Problem -Drivers can help\_\_\_\_\_

Marlow town centre (High St, West St, Spittal St and Chapel St) has been declared an official Air Quality Management Area (AQMA) because NO2 levels are above the legal limit of 40 micrograms per cubic metre as an annual average. Wycombe District Council has published an Air Quality Action Plan including 25 measures aimed at reducing pollution levels.

Marlow Town Council has already taken steps to increase awareness of the issue, and now it is asking residents to help by modifying their behaviour in simple ways.

The Council's message is directed particularly at drivers of older diesel vehicles, which along with lorries and buses, tend to produce more NO2. The pollution gets trapped in the narrow streets of the town centre, particularly Spittal St and Chapel St.

All Marlow residents are asked to consider taking six actions:

- Find out the NO2 emission rating of your vehicle via the EQUA Air Quality website at *https://equaindex.com/equa-air-quality-index/*
- Especially if you drive an older diesel vehicle or other high-NO2 emitting vehicle, please avoid Marlow town centre if you reasonably can for example by using the A404 bypass.
- When driving anywhere in the town centre, keep your speed down and drive smoothly, avoiding acceleration and braking. Not only will this reduce your contribution to NO2 pollution, but eco-driving has also been shown to cut fuel consumption (and therefore greenhouse gas emissions) by up to 15%, as well as reducing accidents.
- Whenever your vehicle is stationary for more than a few seconds, switch off your engine. Idling produces pointless pollution. If your vehicle has stop-start technology fitted, then make sure it is on.
- If you are thinking of changing your vehicle, choose a low-NO2 model, and consider switching to an electric or other ultra-low emission vehicle (ULEV) for greater environmental benefit.
- Try to make more journeys into Marlow town centre on foot or on a bicycle. Active transport is good for health and community as well as for the environment. Marlow Town Council is committed to doing more to encourage walking and cycling.

Exposure to high levels of NO2 is associated with respiratory health problems, particularly for vulnerable groups including children and the elderly, hence the importance of bringing levels down as quickly as possible.

The good news is that NO2 pollution in Marlow town centre is gradually improving as the vehicle fleet gets cleaner. As a result the highest recorded level of pollution in Marlow town centre was 47 micrograms per cubic metre in 2018, down from 57 micrograms in 2014.

Marlow Town Council calls on all residents to help accelerate this trend so that risks to health can be substantially reduced and the Air Quality Management Area status of the town centre can be revoked sooner rather than later.

#### Releaf Marlow: first roots in the ground\_

Marlow Town Council's joint project with Transition Town Marlow to increase the number of trees across the town scored its first success in December 2019 with the planting of six cherry trees on the verge of Lock Road, close to the Marlow Donkey pub.

The planting was championed and funded by Marlow's Mayor Richard Scott, using part of his ward budget. Cllr Scott said: "Lock Road has suffered the loss of some of its trees, and we're hoping that the new ones will soon provide shade, environmental benefits and harbour for wildlife. Hopefully this will be the first of many new trees to grace ourvstreets over the coming months and years."

Last autumn Releaf Marlow volunteers began a comprehensive survey of Marlow's streets and open spaces to see where more trees could be planted. So far, room for more than 1,000 new trees has been identified.

The project organisers hope to achieve at least some additional planting before the weather gets too warm, and have sought permissions from landowners. Among the

sites being looked at are Seymour Recreation Ground, extending an existing community orchard, and roadside verges on the edge of town near Rebellion Brewery.

Releaf Marlow will be aiming to expand its efforts with a view to planting many more new trees in winter 2020/21. To this end volunteers will be spending the summer completing the Marlow tree survey, liaising with landowners, seeking funding and engaging residents.

#### Water Refill Station for Marlow\_

Marlow has a new water refill station in Higginson Park, thanks to a member of Marlow Town Council (MTC) and Wycombe District Council (WDC).

Suzanne Brown has used her ward budget as a Wycombe District Councillor to pay for a water refill station on the edge of Court Garden House, while WDC has paid for the connection.

Phil Irving, a Marlow-based environmental professional on the environment working group, #sustainablemarlow, who championed the Refill scheme, said: "I am really excited that we have another refill point for the people of Marlow. It's becoming easier and easier to carry a water bottle and refill it. And that means fewer bottles bought, drunk and thrown away. Well done Suzanne Brown for making this happen." Residents and visitors to Marlow are also able to refill bottles free of charge at cafes, bars, restaurants and other businesses displaying Refill window stickers to show they have signed up to a free Refill app.





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# **Eco Forum**

#### Local primary schools work together to promote sustainability

n October 2019, Spinfield School began a Sustainability Pledge initiative where children and their families made simple practical pledges to improve the health of our planet. This was such a success they decided to share the initiative with other Marlow Primary Schools and as a result 1,668 pledges have been made by the children and families of St.Peter's, Holy Trinity, Burford, Frieth and Foxes Piece Primary Schools. The children were inspired by Greta Thunberg and her assertion that "no one is too small to make a difference", they also believe they have a special superpower -PESTER power, which will "encourage" their families to make good choices!

The schools involved attended an Eco Forum held at Spinfield Primary School in December 2019 attended by Marlow Lead Cllr Jocelyn Towns and Mr Phil Irving of the Environment Agency. The children listened to what Marlow Town Council is doing to promote sustainability, and shared ideas and made suggestions.

One of these was to promote a certificate scheme for shops that do not provide plastic bags but use more sustainable alternatives or encourage people to use their own bags!

They also decided to initiate a Waste-Free Wednesday in their schools. Each Wednesday they will try to bring completely waste-free lunchboxes to school and avoid wasteful packaging. All of the schools involved agreed to meet again in a follow up Forum in the summer term and to stay closely linked and work together as they believe that by working together, they can make a real impact.

Children in Marlow are passionate, well informed and concerned about the health of their planet and are engaged in working together to make a difference.

#### Support the Wild Marlow Gardens Campaign

This spring, on 1st April, Wild Marlow will be launching a major new campaign encouraging domestic gardeners to welcome wildlife.

Gold, silver and bronze award certificates will be given to those who satisfy three different levels of criteria, and all Wild Marlow members awarded a gold certificate will be eligible for a special Wild Marlow blue heart to display in their garden or wildlife area.

Categories considered include garden management, covering areas such as pesticides, compost and hedgehog routes; wildlife food features, which include nectar-rich flowers, bird feeding-stations and types of fruit and vegetables grown; wildlife shelter features such as climbing plants and insect hotels; and garden water features like ponds and water butts.

The Wild Marlow Gardens Campaign supports the national BLUE campaign, which has been running since 2014, promoting the rewilding of gardens and other open spaces across the UK.

Away from domestic gardens, Wild Marlow hopes to be able to offer larger Wild Marlow blue hearts for display in recognition of wildlife friendly environments and practices in other open spaces such as parks, road verges, churchyards, school grounds and commercial properties. #### Repair revolution comes to Bucks

There is a repair revolution gathering pace in Buckinghamshire and the County Council is encouraging people to take part in the county's Repair Cafés.

Repair Cafés are free meeting places where people come together to repair things. Visitors bring their broken items from home. Working together with specialists they make repairs so that the item continues its useful life rather than becoming part of the vast amount of rubbish our society produces.

And the idea is spreading! There are over 1,500 Repair Cafés worldwide and Buckinghamshire is now home to three.

The Marlow Repair Café has been going for over year, Aston Clinton has just recently held its first event and Princes Risborough held its first this February. Buckinghamshire County Council (BCC) is supporting these volunteer groups and is putting the call out for any other groups that want to get started.

Bill Chapple OBE, BCC Cabinet Member for Planning & Environment, said: "It's been called the throwaway society – the tendency to simply replace an item with something new when the slightest fault or damage occurs. The old item just becomes waste, even though it could have easily been repaired with a little time and some basic know-how.

Working together with specialists they make repairs so that the item continues its useful life rather than becoming part of the vast amount of rubbish our society produces

"That's where the Repair Café comes in. It's a place where people get together to share practical knowledge, and have fun mending and repairing their things to give them a new lease of life. Repairing has a double environmental benefit - not only does the old item not have to be disposed of as waste, but Earth's valuable resources don't have to be used in the manufacture of a replacement.

"So, if you have a broken item, want to volunteer your skills or just want to find out what it's all about, why not pop along to the next Repair Café near you?"



#### Marlow Repair Café

The Marlow Repair Café is an opportunity for people to learn how to fix their own items, rather than throwing them away. This can range from electronics to furniture, or from jewellery to bikes.

The café is organised bi-monthly alongside the Marlow Market in the All Saints Church Hall, from 10am until 1pm.

# Snooze It, Don't Lose It

Sleep advice for when the clocks go forward



D on't sacrifice your sleep when the clocks go forward on Sunday, 29th March. When it comes to the weekend's "lost hour", advice from The Sleep Council is to "snooze it rather than lose it."

Chief Advisor Lisa Artis says: "Rather than lose an hour's sleep, shave it from the day and have an extra hour in bed, if you possibly can. Although it's only 60 minutes, it can affect our body clocks which in turn affects our sleep patterns."

Make sure young children don't over-indulge in sugary treats before bedtime as the ensuing sugar rush could keep them bouncing long into the night!

Not so easy for those with small children who don't understand Daylight Saving Time adjustments! According to research from America\*, whether the clocks go forward or back, around half of parents questioned said it affected their children. More than a quarter (29%) reported more difficulty getting children to sleep after the time change. And of those who reported bedtime challenges, 94% said it took two or more days to get youngsters back into their regular sleep pattern.



Lisa said: "It can take people of any age time to get back into a routine and that can impact on energy levels, general wellbeing and even productivity at work."

So, if you're among those unable to "snooze it rather than lose it", or are wondering how to steer children through the time change, try following **The Sleep Council's top tips for taking on the clocks:** 


- Move bedtime a little earlier, by just 10 minutes or so, in the days approaching the clocks going forward. It won't seem too bad come Sunday when you lose those precious 60 minutes.
- With a change of natural light patterns, keep the bedroom as dark as possible. Light suppresses secretion of the sleep-inducing hormone melatonin.
  So, while it is important to expose yourself to natural light during the waking hours as much as possible, conversely, do not expose yourself to bright light when it is dark outside.
- Practice good sleep hygiene. Create a sleep-friendly environment that enhances your chances of falling asleep, staying asleep and sleeping well. This includes a cool temperature (around 16-18 degrees) and eliminating distractions (i.e. banning mobiles, tablets etc. in the hour before bed).
- It may sound simple, but make sure your bed is comfortable. It's difficult to get deep, restful sleep on one that's too soft, too hard, too small or too old. If it's older than seven years, maybe use the weekend to look at replacing it.
- Try not to overindulge in caffeine, food and alcohol over the clock change weekend, as these all have a negative impact on sleep. Similarly, try to make sure young children don't over-indulge in sugary treats before bedtime as the ensuing sugar rush could keep them bouncing long into the night!
- If you can't sleep, don't lie there worrying about it. Get up and do something you find relaxing such as reading a book until you feel sleepy again – then go back to bed.




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# Who Does What?
