

Mayor's Message

In the last Marlovian, I commented on the Covid pandemic and how pleasing it was to see most retailers and other services had re-opened, along with the majority of our excellent cafes and restaurants. How rapidly things have changed, but I hope that by the time you receive your copy of the Marlovian, we will be free of the lockdown restrictions. All of us wish to be rid of this pandemic and get our lives and businesses back to a level of normality.

We continue to keep all residents informed about changes in Government guidance on Covid-19, service information from Buckinghamshire Council and other bodies through regular updates on the Town Council Facebook page and website **www.marlow-tc.gov.uk**. Just to re-visit November; Marlow is widely recognised for its Remembrance Day commemorations, which this year had to be cancelled. Not to be put off, the Town Council prepared a virtual service that was broadcast on a number of social media sites on Sunday 8th November. This included all the elements of our usual service, featuring wreath laying in All Saints Church, the Kohima epitaph, the Piper's Lament, the last post and roll of all

the names of The Fallen. A very moving service, a link to which can be found on our website. (See page 18).

Moving to the festive period, we all hope that we can enjoy the Christmas and New Year celebrations with our families and friends. Unfortunately, the Council had to cancel the traditional opening event for the Christmas period - the excellent Switch on and Shop evening planned for 19th November. We were however able to hold this virtually (see page 12) and I hope you will enjoy the new, extended lights and decorations. The carol service around the Christmas tree on The Causeway planned for 17th December may also have to be cancelled, but again, we are looking to see if this can be broadcast virtually. The Marlow Chamber of Commerce is also looking forward to a full re-opening of shops, restaurants and businesses and you should look at their activities on their website "Make it a Marlow Christmas", www.marlowchamber.com.

Charities and voluntary organisations have suffered a lack of income over the past nine months, so perhaps over the coming weeks, you might like to support one or two of your choice. Christmas Free Parking _

The Council has arranged for free parking in all Buckinghamshire Council-owned car parks — Court Garden, Riley Road Central, Dean Street, Liston Road and Spittal Street – on Saturday, 12th and 19th December.

Night-Time Patrols

The Council has now extended its very successful night-time patrol scheme of town green spaces to include Higginson Park and Rookery Court, in addition to Gossmore and Seymour Parks. The scheme, which is operated by 4Front Security, is working to eradicate anti-social behaviour in the town's green spaces during the night.

MVAS Mobile Activated Sign

The Council has purchased a further two of these mobile signs so there are now three at our disposal to monitor and alert drivers to their speed in the town. The data gathered from these is shared with Bucks Highways and the Police.

Wiltshire Road Roundabout

The baskets and planters on the Wiltshire Road roundabout have been an absolute riot of colour this summer. This much-neglected roundabout was taken on for planting by the Council last year. The plants and baskets are all funded by the Council — not the company named on the advertising hoardings!

Causeway Clean Up ____

Grounds maintenance and footpath clearance has been in full swing to keep the town tidy. The War Memorial at The Causeway and the stonework around it has been thoroughly cleaned, bedding plants have been replaced and the grass has had a final cut before winter.

Focus on climate change _

Marlow Town Council wishes to raise awareness of the importance of reducing the town's carbon emissions to help minimise climate change.

The average person is responsible for about 11 tonnes of carbon dioxide-equivalent emissions per year. Carbon dioxide-equivalent is a measure of the global warming impact of several different greenhouse gases. According to local experts, the carbon footprint of the average Marlow resident could be one-third higher than the UK national average!

Clean Air Plan

Air quality in Marlow town centre improved in 2019, but some illegal pollution remained. Marlow Town Council is supporting all efforts to cut air pollution and asks residents and businesses to play their part.

Marlow town centre was designated an Air Quality Management Area in 2017, due to high levels of nitrogen dioxide, or NO2. This gas comes mainly from road traffic emissions and is dangerous for human health.


Buckinghamshire Council's latest annual report on air quality in Marlow was released in the summer. It shows that in 2019 NO2 levels fell by an average of 6% across all monitoring stations. On the other hand, despite the decline in NO2 the level recorded at the highest single monitoring station was still 9% above the maximum level allowed by law. **This shows more needs to be done.**

Buckinghamshire Council has the lead responsibility for traffic and air pollution issues, but Marlow Town Council has sought to play its part by publishing its own Clean Air Plan. Under the plan the Town Council has put up street banners encouraging eco-driving to reduce emissions. It is exploring other actions too and working with Buckinghamshire Council on a voluntary town centre speed limit of 20 mph.

The Town Council is asking all Marlow residents and businesses to reduce their contribution to high NO2, for example by preferring a "low-NOx" model when choosing a new vehicle; by walking or cycling to the town centre rather than driving; and by avoiding engine idling whenever stationary.

Releaf Marlow


A community trees project supported by Marlow Town Council is preparing for a first round of planting this winter, and is asking Marlow residents to get involved. Christ Church Water Filler

Church and Council team up to provide refreshment for Marlow

Less than a fortnight after Marlow Town Council inaugurated its new water bottle filling station at The Causeway, another public water point has been opened by Christ Church United Reformed Church on Oxford Road. The project was led by the church and supported by a grant from the Council.

The first bottle was filled on 30th October by the Mayor of Marlow, Cllr Richard Scott, with the support also of the Leader of the Council, Cllr Jocelyn Towns. The church was represented by Revd David Downing and the Church Secretary, Mrs Valerie Brownridge. (See photo).

The new bottle filler is at the entrance to the garden of Christ Church URC. The garden is provided by the church for public use and, since opening a new entrance in June, has become a place of peace and relaxation for many more passers-by. Now they can also refresh themselves with a drink of water!

Cllr Scott said: "It was important for the town to be able to give both residents and visitors easy access to clean

water, keeping up progress in reducing the huge number of plastic bottles that are thrown away each year." He added that the provision of on-street bottle fillers was especially valuable currently, as Covid restrictions have limited access to pubs and cafés.

Marlow Solar Streets



Solar panel Zoom presentation and special offer

We all know that we must use less energy for the sake of our children and grandchildren, and that the energy we use must be as green as possible. To this end Marlow Energy Group (MEG), a not for profit Community Benefit Society, in association with IDDEA, a solar panels installation, operations and maintenance company, is arranging a 'Marlow Solar Streets' Zoom event scheduled for 19th January 2021. IDDEA is based in Westbury, Wiltshire, and has already installed 700 solar projects in the south and south-west. For more information see **www.iddea.co.uk**

The highly competitive figure of £4,000 for 12 panels is being offered on the basis that IDDEA can make at least 10 installations in and around Marlow. The Zoom presentation will expand on IDDEA's offer to install 12 photo-voltaic (PV) electricity-generating solar panels (subject to a successful free survey) to homeowners in Marlow. The system is 4kWp and will save around 1 tonne of CO2 each year. All other aspects such as financial savings, battery storage and extra panel costs will be covered during the Zoom get-together.

"We're hugely grateful to Chris for helping us to switch on our renowned Christmas lights this year," the Mayor





The challenges of creating a true Christmas spirit in the midst of a pandemic are very real – and countless traditional ways of fostering seasonal goodwill have been lost due to social distancing and cancellation of the usual festive gatherings. Remembrance Sunday



Thousands watch memorial service online

ver 11,600 people from all over the world watched Marlow's streamed Remembrance Service on Sunday, 8th November. The service was filmed in advance at All Saints' Church.

Marlow Town Council and the Royal British Legion were determined to ensure that Remembrance was honoured, despite not being able to have the usual service. They prepared to film a service to be shown for public participation on Remembrance Sunday. Several days' filming were organised — and then lockdown came, and everything changed. The final day of filming was scheduled for Thursday 5th November but all the plans had to be moved forward a day.

"Despite all the uncertainty and many changed plans, the streamed service was really special and unique," Mayor Richard Scott said. "We're delighted that we were able to bring it to so many people. It was a different way of remembering, but also very moving and appropriate."

Countess Elizabeth Howe laid a wreath on behalf of the Queen, while Andrew Farncombe Esq, High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire, and Marlow Mayor Richard Scott together laid a wreath on behalf of Buckinghamshire Council. Deputy Mayor Bob Johnson laid a wreath on behalf of Marlow Town Council. Many organisations that would normally attend the traditional event at the War Memorial were in attendance, including representatives from the Royal Marines, RAF, Air Cadets and Sea Cadets. John Chapman, MBE, gave the Royal British Legion Exhortation and The Kohima Epitaph.

Dave Bull of All Saints, Nick Thompson from Marlow Methodist Church and Anthea Wratten from River Church all took part. Marlow Town Council thanks Tim Ashburner for offering his services free to film all parts of the service at All Saints' Church.

he people of Marlow flocked to see an exhibition of the winning photos from Wild Marlow's Photo Competition at All Saints Church Hall over the weekend of 17th and 18th October. Over four hundred visitors attended and voted for the 'People's Choice' from 24 pictures selected by the judges. It was a very close contest, with the final 'People's Choice' winning by a whisker – 'I've Been Fishing' by Louise Donovan.

Mayor Richard Scott awarded prizes to the overall winner, Paris Losasso, whose 'Sunset Fox' also won the adult category; Kitty Hayward (15) with 'Green Stops', who won Senior School category; and Jacob Walker (7), who won the Junior School category with his picture: 'Mute Swans of Marlow'. There were over 80 entries to the competition in total.


"The entries were extremely high quality," Mayor Scott said. "It's wonderful to see the extraordinary range of wildlife that can be found in and around Marlow. With the work of groups like Wild Marlow and many others in the town, I hope we can continue to encourage and preserve our precious environment."

The aim of the contest was to stimulate interest in and appreciation of the wildlife and habitats around Marlow. The winning photos from each of the three categories – and the People's Choice - will go into Wild Marlow's 2021 calendar, available soon for £10 each from **www.wildmarlow.org.uk** and in selected shops in the town.

Wild Marlow is a group of enthusiasts passionate about wildlife and protecting biodiversity in the Marlow area, engaging the local community through interesting events, competitions, volunteering and work parties to raise awareness of the importance of a balanced ecosystem. The group covers all areas of Marlow within the SL7 postcode, including Bisham, Great Marlow, Marlow Bottom and Little Marlow. Membership is £10 for individuals (allows free/reduced entry to some events). 

Breaking New Ground

Mayor opens Marlow Methodists building project

ften described as a "hidden gem," Marlow Methodist Church will soon be a lot less hidden. Building work has begun to create a community hub and café for the town and transform the existing church facilities. The Spittal Street site already provides meeting spaces for many of the town's organisations in the Wesley Hall – one of the most popular halls in Marlow – but Church members have identified a need for more modern spaces that can be used by outside organisations, particularly advice agencies.

The café will be situated in a brand new rotunda at the front of the building and will be open five days a week, providing hospitality and meeting spaces. The sanctuary of the church, which has some important Art Nouveau stained glass, will not be changed and Sunday Worship will continue, with Covid restrictions for the time being. Online services were introduced at the beginning of the pandemic and these will continue.

Commenting on the plans, Minister and Superintendent of the High Wycombe District of the Methodist Church Rev Nick Thompson said: "Any building of this age has its needs and over the decades generations have made changes and improved different aspects. Now we have the opportunity to release the potential of the building to help us in our aim to be ever more outward-looking and welcoming. We would like to give everyone in the local community a building which meets their needs and creates a real sense of belonging."

Oxford-based architects Leap Design were commissioned to create a building that would better fit the needs and lifestyles of the 21st Century. One of the biggest challenges was to "connect" the Church with the Wesley Hall and with other rooms. Lead Architect Kelvin Sampson explains: "A lack of cohesion, limited storage space and inadequate kitchen and toilet facilities meant that the building was under-utilised. Sensitive adaptation of the building will have a profound impact on its usefulness for the Church to further its work and mission in Marlow."

Project Leader David Duxbury, who has spearheaded the project from its inception three years ago, has dealt with many challenges along the way, not least the arrival of Covid 19 earlier this year: "This is an exciting project and we have seen it develop from the concept stage to the point where building work can begin. Everyone involved has worked very hard, not least the fundraising team who have made it all possible. We have received many generous grants and donations and we are very grateful to everyone who has helped in this way."

Mayor of Marlow, Cllr Richard Scott, cut the ribbon at the site and wished the project well, saying he was "delighted to be opening such an exciting project 'for real' during this Covid period." (Left photo).






