Divorce and financial settlement tax considerations

When a relationship breaks down there is an enormous impact on the individuals involved. For many people, the priority is the children or how they are going to be able to afford to put a roof over their heads after the separation.

When caught up in such significant change, it is easy to overlook some of the less obvious effects of the relationship breakdown which could have a substantial financial impact.

Although most of us are aware that "the only two certainties in life are death and taxes" often tax issues relating to the breakdown of the relationship are overlooked.

When considering options for settlement it is vital that you understand the tax implications of the options available to you. Money drawn from a business is likely to incur tax liabilities as will the encashment of shares and some investments.

In many cases couples who own second homes together or individually need to decide whether these should be sold or transferred from one or another to allow them to rehouse. As with any disposal, there are likely to be capital gains tax implications for selling a property or transferring it. These need to be considered when looking at a divorce settlement or when leaving a cohabiting relationship.

Even the sale or transfer of the family home can have tax implications, particularly if one of the owners has left the family home for some time and regardless of whether they have bought another home.

Although tax might be due on the transfer of assets, there is relief that might be available in some cases and you need to be aware of this. The timing of the transfer or sale of the property can also be critical.

The current rules regarding taxation are due to change as a result of the proposed new revisions which will be introduced in the Finance Bill 2022/2023.

These changes are due to take effect in April 2023 which could benefit individuals but again, timing is essential.

Although solicitors are not tax experts, it is important that your solicitor highlights any tax issues and refers you to specialist tax advisers, if they feel it is necessary, so that you are not adversely affected by tax and that any tax liabilities are considered in a financial settlement.

Mayor's Message

Welcome to spring

This will be my last message in the Marlovian as I shall be standing down as your Mayor at our Annual General Meeting on 9th May – a public meeting to which the Council welcomes all residents.

I have served for four years as Mayor, the first two of which were affected by Covid, when most public engagements were cancelled. The Council was however able to continue with its statutory duties and our regular events, such as Remembrance Day and Christmas Switch On, took place in very innovative ways. Since then, life has changed from what we might have considered 'normal'. During these last two years, I have been able to attend and support many of our town events although some organisations have experienced less activity than previously; and I have represented Marlow at numerous civic events in the County and elsewhere including Marly le Roi. To round off my last year in office, I shall be holding a Civic Celebration at All Saints Church at 3pm on Sunday, 12th March. This event will include presentations from town organisations and choirs to reflect our community spirit and I invite you to attend.

Despite Covid and economic setbacks, Marlow continues to be a busy town with an excellent community spirit, a great place to live work and visit. Sadly, a number of businesses have closed, but most have been replaced; and whilst there continues to be a number of empty retail premises, we have not suffered in quite the same way as other towns. This was also evidenced by a recent BBC

online article, and I quote:

"Towns with shops, offices and housing all within walking distance - what planners call a 15-minute city - have done well. Town centres recording the biggest increase in activity include: Marlow: 33%; Glossop: 33%; Matlock: 32%; Colchester: 26%; Buxton: 26%; and Melton Mowbray: 23%".

In January, as part of the Council's environmental strategy we launched The BIG Sustainable Marlow Challenge which encourages simple steps towards greener lifestyles, helping Marlow to reduce its carbon emissions and to help nature. Full details are on our website, which I encourage you to visit and there is further information in this Marlovian.

Finally, as spring and summer approach we can look forward to our popular town events including Round Table May Fayre and Pub in the Park, both in May; the Town Regatta and Festival with Traylens Fun Fayre in June; and not forgetting our twice monthly market on The Causeway (elsewhere in the Marlovian, we outline minor improvements and enhancements to The Causeway).

On behalf of the Town Council, I wish you and your families a great spring and summer.

Town Council News

Spring 2023

Budget agreed for 2023/24 at Town Council Meeting on 24th January__

We are pleased to announce that during this difficult economic environment the Town Council was able to prepare a balanced annual budget for fiscal year 2023/2024 that does not result in an increase in parish tax to our households.

The Town Council is committed to continue to provide much valued services and community events to its residents and has been carefully reviewing income and expenditure to ensure that residents get good value for money and important services continue to be effectively delivered.

We are not projecting an increase in revenues, which means careful management of expenses is necessary. Unfortunately, due to inflationary pressures, most of our costs are projected to increase — for example, the projected salaries for the office staff that work hard to look after our town are expected to increase in line with inflation. The other big item projected to increase is utilities including business rates, water, electricity and gas.

In order to manage costs for the benefit of our residents and not to seek an increase in parish tax, some of our community events planned for 2023/2024 will be covered through existing reserves that either were earmarked for specific purposes or come from the general reserves.

We are committed to reviewing and scrutinising our contract commitments and expenses to find real savings for the town and its residents. Although the town has always been prudent, we understand that securing value for money has become even important in the current environment.

Despite many challenges, we hope to have a great year ahead full of exciting community events, valuable services and support to our residents and we expect the current budget to deliver on our promises.



Marlow Town Council is responsible for:

- Events such as: Remembrance Day Service & Parade, Carols on The Causeway, Switch on and Shop, and Mayor's Civic Celebration.
- Two allotment sites Hanging Hill off Prospect Road and Foxes Piece.
- The Cemetery and chapel at Wethered Road.
- May Balfour Gardens in Institute Road.
- A contribution to Marlow town bus service.
- Shopmobility in Marlow, based at Court Garden Leisure Centre.
- Gossmore Recreation Ground, football pitch.
- Seymour Park including the play areas.
- Riley Park and Campbell Road play areas.
- Grass and hedge cutting in designated areas.
- Hanging baskets and planters throughout the town centre and Wiltshire Road roundabout.
- Removal of flyposters and illegal signs on public highway and attached to street furniture.
- Contribution towards Marlow's PCSO.
- Night-time security patrols of Seymour Park recreation ground, Rookery Park, Gossmore and Higginson Park.

Fix My Street

Found a pothole? Blocked drain in the road? Damage to kerbs and pavements? Streetlight not working? Did you know that the easiest and quickest way to get any of these problems fixed is by reporting it online? Buckinghamshire Council is responsible for these issues, which can all be reported online. You will receive an immediate email acknowledgement of your issue, a follow-up report with a timescale to fix the issue and finally an email when the problem is resolved. The system is simple and easy to use, and you can choose not to have your name shown publicly. You can also see on their interactive map all the other problems that have been logged locally. Town bus_

Marlow town bus operates on weekdays in and around the town centre and to and from Maidenhead and High Wycombe. It is run by Buckinghamshire Council and to support this important service we pay Bucks £6,300 per year. If you leave the car at home for that trip to the shops, to the park or to work, you can help reduce congestion and improve air quality at the same time. 

The Causeway Renovation


Plans to improve popular area for residents and visitors



Mayor Richard Scott said: "The area around The Causeway has had the same configuration for many years and represents a landmark in the town. However, there are not many seating areas, spreading tree branches use up space and flagpole guy ropes extend

over a large area, creating a tripping hazard and limiting walking space.

"Recently the local market has been using more of the area and it has become apparent that people do enjoy this space. However, it is not easy to manoeuvre around or to rest — and the benches all face the road, rather than the memorial. We would like to create more space for people to reflect on the war memorial, enjoy the Frohman Statue and take shade under the trees."



The Council plans to resurface and level the grassed

Trees will be lightly trimmed to lift low hanging branches and most of the benches will be turned inwards, allowing people to enjoy the area rather than face the traffic.

Overall, there will not be a significant visual change, but the Council hopes the plans will enable better use of The Causeway. The final plan will be confirmed following internal and external consultation.

Project Groundwater

Innovative groundwater flooding project launched in Marlow

In the Chiltern Hills and Berkshire Downs, almost 200 communities and 70,000 properties are at risk of groundwater flooding. Compared to other forms of flooding, groundwater flooding often has longer-lasting impacts on communities, but as it is less frequent and less understood, it often fails to qualify for flood management funding.

Project Groundwater is working to fill this gap, operating across the Chiltern Hills and Berkshire Downs to support nine at-risk communities to be prepared for groundwater flooding, with Marlow having been identified as one of these communities.

Recognising the critical role that communities play in flood prevention and recovery, the project will be working closely with local authorities, local community flood groups and the general public, to increase awareness and resilience to groundwater flooding in Marlow.

By working together, Project Groundwater will develop innovative and sustainable solutions to groundwater flooding that will:

- share understanding and increase awareness
- actively monitor flood events and improve warning systems
- prepare communities to respond to and withstand flood events

On The Verge

Pollinators to be supported with natural verges in Marlow



s part of a county- and country-wide effort, Marlow Town Council (MTC) is taking a natural approach to support insect life and expand the biodiversity of specific areas of our town.

This natural verge project aims to recreate and encourage insect-friendly environments after a dramatic reduction in biodiversity across the UK over the last 50 years. These small but mighty pollinators are vital to the whole planet's ecosystem. With 75% of crops in Britain relying on pollinating insects and animals. These pollinator-dependant crops provide food, fibres and medicine for humans and other animals.

Currently there are approximately 1,500 pollinating insects left in the UK — but there has been a decline of between 20% and 50% in some species due to lose of natural habitat. Humans have adversely affected the insect environment for decades, and it's vital that we as a town do as much as we can to address this issue as it ultimately affects us all. Encouraging these habitats on roadside verges enables these vital pollinators to thrive, move around more freely to farmlands and edible plants, and to create pollinator highways or corridors linking habitats together.



This new pollinator-friendly approach in Marlow will help us create natural wildflower corridors on the verges of the side roads. What this means to residents is that in specific areas in and into the town and not immediately in front of resident's homes, verge cuts will be reduced to three this year and the grass cuttings will be removed. This method of removing the grass cuttings helps make the soil less fertile for planted grass and helps the more natural thinner grasses come through instead. The first year or two it may not look like much, and the grass will grow longer initially, but we need to give nature time to come back. Each year the biodiversity will increase and



the naturally occurring wildflowers will return as well, although they may not be visible for the first year or two during this transition.

Additionally, the Council will maintain the original curated wildflower sites around town that have offered beautiful displays for the last couple years, as well as the wild habitat area (where we do not cut the grass) in the northwest corner of Rookery Gardens. Council are currently identifying appropriate areas adjacent to main roads, open spaces and in or near parks. Residential roads and the town cemetery will remain on their usual cutting regime.

If you are interested in doing more to support our pollinators, specifically bees, we recommend leaving out a small dish of water for bees in the hot weather (remembering that bumblebees do not generally sting unless they are threatened). Or even plant your own wildflower patch. If you decide to plant your own, we ask that you please ensure that the seed mix you purchase is native to the UK — and it's best to avoid using artificial fertiliser where possible. Soil that is low in fertility is better for growing wildflowers due to the low levels of phosphates and nitrogen.

If you see any interesting insects or plant life in your local verges this year, please take a photo and write to the Council at **office@marlow-tc.gov.uk**. Additionally, the UK Pollinator Monitoring Scheme has been set up to collate information on insect life in verges along UK roads and the scheme will start again for the year on 1st April 2023. Releaf Marlow

Expanding Marlow's green canopy

reen-fingered volunteers have planted more than 100 new trees in and around Marlow this winter, making it another busy year for community trees group Releaf Marlow, a project of Transition Town Marlow. More trees add beauty to our town and are good for both wildlife and the climate.

This year's programme was helped by cooperative landowners, and government funding secured through Buckinghamshire Council, plus extra support from the county's South-West Chilterns Community Board.

Excitingly, the new trees include more than 60 native black poplars, planted in farmland close to the Thames upstream from Marlow, and in the Spade Oak nature reserve downstream. Black poplar is Britain's rarest native tree and a boon to wildlife. The project bolsters Buckinghamshire's position as the UK capital of this species.

On farmland at Bovingdon Green, volunteers planted not only trees but also more than 100 metres of mixed broadleaved hedging. At Harleyford Golf Club more than 30 new trees were added between the fairways. Releaf Marlow also cooperated with residents' groups to plant new urban trees commemorating valuable events or people. Among these was a new silver birch in Riley Recreation Ground, planted with the Marlow Common Women's Institute to mark the late Queen's platinum jubilee.

Meanwhile, Releaf Marlow's new Free Family Trees scheme supplied more than 75 native saplings to requesting households around Marlow, to be planted in gardens. This project helps to expand Marlow's urban green canopy and improve the town's climate resilience.

Higginson Park Charity


Charity behind Marlow's popular public park



Higginson Park and Court Garden House, owned by the Higginson Park Charity, are among Marlow's best-loved spots.

The mansion, within the estate now known as Higginson Park, was built in 1758. The estate had various owners until the early 1920s, when it was due to be sold and divided into small plots for riverside homes. In response, a group of local people began fundraising by private subscription from members of the public for its purchase for the benefit of the town of Marlow and to commemorate the 100th birthday of General Sir George Higginson. Princess Mary, the Princess Royal, presented the deeds to General Higginson who in turn presented them to the town of Marlow.

Initially, trustees were appointed to administer the funds, with a company later being formed to administer the Trust Property. In 1928, this company conveyed part of the site to Marlow Urban District Council, subject to a covenant to use it as a public park and recreation ground.

The decades that followed saw the acquisition of the freehold of Court Garden House and the development of a wide range of facilities in the park, as well as the theatre and leisure complex completed in the mid-1970s. Following successive rounds of local government reorganisation, Buckinghamshire Council is now the corporate trustee for the Higginson Park Charity, with a duty to apply the charity's property in or towards the following charitable objective:

'The provision and maintenance for the benefit of the inhabitants of the district of Wycombe, with particular regard for the inhabitants of the town of Marlow, of a public park, ornamental gardens and recreation ground, with such facilities for physical exercise, training, lectures, classes and other forms of recreation or leisure-time occupation in the interests of social welfare, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants as the Trustee shall from time to time think fit.'

The charity income is used for the cost of repairs, insurance and all other expenditure in respect of the property. This income comes from a range of sources including events, rent from the occupants of Court Garden House and the concessions in the park, car parking, and income from the leisure complex. The charity has also benefited from council grants, most recently for upgrades to the leisure centre, and for the replacement of the hugely popular children's play area (coming later this year!). The charity accounts can be found on the Charity Commission website.

Marlow Town Council and Buckinghamshire Council are committed to continuing to work closely so that the park's Green Flag award-winning facilities can be enjoyed by generations to come.

Buckinghamshire Council acts as the trustee of the Higginson Park Trust and manages the public open space.





Obituary: Lance Slater

In memory of popular Marlow town devotee

ance Slater sadly passed away on 1st January 2023. He was a much-loved husband, father and grandfather with three daughters, two stepsons and two grandchildren. Lance and his wife Pauline moved to Marlow in 1984 where he set up his own company in 1990 before retiring in 2003. Pauline said: "The family cannot quantify how much they will miss him. We are such a close and happy family. It's heart-breaking."

Lance was one of the original founder members of the Marlow Town Regatta and Festival, of which he was Vice President, and was a President of Marlow Chamber of Trade. He was also a pivotal member of the Rotary Club of Marlow and was President in 1998.

Lance was called up in 1956 to do his National Service. After basic training he learned Mandarin Chinese and was flown to Hong Kong, (which took a week) where he worked in the radio station on Victoria Peak, listening in to the Chinese ground-to-air messages. He and others translated them and gave warning if there was anything dangerous being planned. He always said he was defending his country.

One cannot over-emphasise the enormous contribution he made to Marlow — and to the Rotary Club in particular. His enthusiasm and commitment meant he was able to accomplish a huge amount.

Chris Kelsey from the Rotary Club of Marlow had the following words to say about Lance at his memorial service, held in the Shelley Theatre on 26th January:

"Lance first joined Rotary in 1985 when he was working as a surveyor in Reading. When Lance set up his own business in Marlow, he transferred to the Rotary Club in Marlow where he quickly made his mark and within a few years, in 1997, became our President.





"It was in those early days that he and Niall Blair organised the fledgling Santa's Fun Run, which has become a hugely successful community event. Through his local connections he organised a number of our activities including the bridge night, the Ascot brass concerts, the seniors boat trip, and many more. He had an easy-going and friendly demeanour, cultivating good relationships with many local organisations. When he asked people to do things he had a way of ensuring they always said yes. He was chair of a number of our committees, particularly the youth committee, and he was instrumental in organising the Best Potential Citizen Awards with Great Marlow School. Even with failing health, he continued to participate in our events, including the boat trip in September and the Marlow Carnival in October. He ensured that we continued to assist the Town Council in serving mulled wine and mince pies at the Town Council Christmas Carol Concert, and he made a number of phone calls in his last few weeks to make sure we would all continue with the good things he was involved with.

"Lance epitomised the Rotary ideal of 'service above self'. This was most evident when he served as our membership secretary and inducted a significant number of our current members into the club. We are most indebted to him for his guidance and enthusiasm. He was well known in the club as a great orator, though his eloquence did sometimes go on longer than expected — a combination of gift of the gab and a bit of the Blarney. He will be fondly remembered both as a Rotarian, but most of all as a friend, and he leaves a big hole in the club and the Marlow community as a whole."
