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The benefits of mediation when resolving family disputes

If you do not feel comfortable with faceto-face mediation, the mediator will offer video mediation or shuttle mediation, where you will each be in a separate room and the mediator will shuttle between you.

What are the benefits?

There are several benefits to the mediation process, some of which are set out below:

Cost effective: Mediation tends to be more cost-effective than involving solicitors. Even if you do not come up with a complete agreement in mediation, the mediator should help you narrow the issues that are being disputed.

Confidential: Disputes resolved through mediation and not in court are completely confidential for both parties involved.

Faster outcome: Mediation generally takes less time to complete, allowing for an earlier solution than through the legal or court route.

More control: Mediation increases the control both parties have over the resolution. Both parties are involved in negotiating their own agreement and no settlement can be imposed upon you.

It improves communication: The

mediation process helps both parties to focus on communicating effectively and relieves the pressure and stress that court disputes may bring.

Flexible: The process is informal and there are no formal rules and evidence required although the mediator at Blaser Mills Law will explain the advantages of full financial disclosure.

Coronation bunting & summer planting _

Your Council has arranged for the installation of hanging baskets and planters throughout the town and town centre. They improve the appearance of the town and are a glorious riot of colour. In addition, to mark the Coronation of King Charles, the high street has been festooned with Union Jack bunting.

In January, the Town Council approved works to update The Causeway and the project were put out to an informal consultation. Around 90 responses were received from residents and the Community Committee subsequently discussed these responses.

At a meeting on 18th April, the full Council agreed to the following changes to the proposals:

- Replace the flagpole, but leave in current location.
- Leave electricity box in present location, resulting in a cost saving of c £5k.
- Level out, repair and refill, where appropriate.
- Trim low hanging trees, subject to any required permissions.
- Review location of benches, being selective on which benches facing the park should be turned round, noting that three out of the current four have a donor plaque on them.
- Locate up to two additional benches on the south side of The Causeway, facing up the High Street.
- Ensure crocus beds are maintained and/or enhanced.

It was also noted that the best time to carry out the work would be in late autumn 2023, after Remembrance weekend, which will be well outside the growing season and less used by the public.



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Buckinghamshire Highways

New partnership aims to improve the county's streets



M onday, 3rd April saw the launch of a dynamic new partnership designed to improve the way roads and footways in Buckinghamshire are maintained and managed, bringing positive changes for residents.

The newly formed 'Buckinghamshire Highways' is an alliance between Buckinghamshire Council and two highly experienced and industry-leading organisations - Balfour Beatty Living Places and Atkins, as well as a number of specialist framework contractors.

Covering all elements of highways maintenance and repair, including pothole repairs, gully cleansing, street lighting, winter gritting and resurfacing works, as well as larger improvement and development programmes, the new arrangements allow the Council to take greater control and increase accountability in maintaining the county's network of almost 2,100 miles of highways and 1,500 miles of footways. Buckinghamshire Highways replaces Transport for Buckinghamshire, which for the previous 13 years managed highways in the county.

The three main partners marked the start of their alliance at a brand-new operational hub at the Griffin Lane depot in Aylesbury. The hub uses the latest technology and has eight 55" screens to monitor activities as they happen, track the progress of works on roads and footways and identify where further efficiencies can be made.

Steven Broadbent, Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet Member for Transport, said: "Over a number of months we've been working on ensuring a smooth transition to Buckinghamshire Highways. We looked at what wasn't working so well and have created an organisation that can better respond to the needs of everyone using the highways. I'm pleased that all partners in our new alliance share our commitment to giving residents the best value for money, to innovation and to finding better ways of doing things and share the council's determination to reduce carbon emissions in their work."

Buckinghamshire Highways will continue the multimillion-pound investment pledged by Buckinghamshire Council towards improving the county's roads. Earlier this year the Council announced a further £5m investment alongside the £100m over four years it has already set aside to deal with the worst affected areas. This extra investment follows on from the impact of recent weather, where the combination of freezing temperatures, followed by long periods of heavy rainfall, have worsened conditions on even more of the county's roads.

Despite the difficult economic climate, the Town has finished its fiscal year in a good fiscal position. We realised increased revenues from both investment income and cemetery fees which enabled us to support and




finance many enhanced services for our residents.

Among these we continued to pay for grass cutting and caring for our public spaces, providing our town with extra security through financial contributions for a Police Community Support Officer and delivering additional patrols of our parks and green spaces by a private security firm, contributing to the town bus service, purchasing and maintaining bunting and summer floral displays around town, as well as continuing to print and distribute the much-loved Marlovian magazine.

We also continued to organise and sponsor some amazing celebrations of the important events that became so iconic in our town such as the Remembrance Parade, the Swan Upping, the Civic Service that showcases the best of volunteering and the community spirit of Marlow, and of course the annual Christmas Celebrations including the high street Christmas lights switch-on and our wonderful Carols on The Causeway event with a lovely orchestra, a choir, mulled wine and mince pies. The additional highlight this past year was the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in Higginson Park that brought much of our community and visitors together to enjoy the day out with live entertainment and fun activities.

Our annual budget also supported maintenance of our allotments and cemetery, waste management and required site inspections for health and safety of the residents and visitors.

As we move into the new financial year we will continue to review and evaluate our expenditures and financials commitments where our resources are most impactful and valued by the local community and will continue to build on our healthy reserves. Our projected budget for 2023/2024 has been balanced with no increases in parish tax to our residents. We also will be looking to review our accounting systems and processes for efficiency and improved delivery.

Planning

Marlow Town Council is a statutory consultee to the local planning Buckinghamshire Authority. The Planning and Transport (PT) Committee meets every three weeks to review planning applications within the Marlow town boundary.

We review all applications carefully and make appropriate comment or objections.

The bulk of applications reviewed each year are for minor extensions or changes of use and we have a strong correlation with the Planning Authority findings. The Wycombe Local Plan was approved without any major changes that affect Marlow. It maintained our Green Belt protection areas against developer threats. A new Local plan for Buckinghamshire will begin to be developed in the near future which will supersede the Wycombe Plan in due course. It is still some time away and is unlikely to have major impact on Marlow.

Developments under consideration by Buckinghamshire

planning department include the Marlow Studio project for whose revised planning application is expected to be reviewed by the strategic sites committee in the very near future. The proposal for the new schools boathouse at Gossmore was finally approved earlier this year after protracted negotiations.

Transport

We are always mindful of the challenge of parking availability in the town, largely brought about by the vibrancy of the town itself, but solutions that satisfy residents, shoppers and inward commuters (all of whom are essential to the viability of the town) prove to be very challenging. We are working with Buckinghamshire Council towards a post-Covid travel plan and are looking at options for improving the Town Bus service with a more enviroment-friendly operation. We supported the new quietway on Trinity Road.

The Committee is looking forward to another busy and productive year for Marlow.

The new Community committee was established in November 2021 to lead on events; manage how your Council communicates with residents and other stakeholders;



deliver projects and services to enrich and improve the Marlow community in areas such as economic development and tourism; community safety, community engagement and community cohesion. The committee consists of five members and is chaired by the incumbent Mayor. We continued to offer residents several very successful events throughout the year.

On 3rd June 2022, we celebrated the platinum anniversary of HM The Queen with "Party Like The Queen" in Higginson Park. It had a 1950's theme and included entertainment for the whole family and vintage food and drink stalls. All helped by glorious weather, thousands of residents and visitors enjoyed a really great day.

This year, we have organised an informal event in Higginson Park to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III. Taking place on Saturday, 6th May, "Party Like The King" will be sharing the park with Marlow & District Round Table May Fayre and will include entertainment for the whole family, a large screen on which to watch the coronation service and, food and drink

2022 saw the 50th anniversary of town twining with Marly le Roi, France. This very successful arrangement was recognised in France on 7th May with councillors and members of Marlow Marly town twinning association attending. To commemorate this historic event, I planted a tree in Marly le Roi and presented a commemorative plaque to their town council. Isabella had some well expressed and well developed ideas, particularly on involving the residents of Marlow to cut down on electricity use, reduce litter and plant more trees and vegetables. She was encouraging and persuasive in her approach.

During the morning of Wednesday, 19th of April, Cllr Richard Scott, Marlow Town Mayor, spoke about the Town Council's efforts to fight climate change and presented Isabella with the winning cheque. Also present were MEG Directors Jane Mann and Martin Fry. Rachel Addy, Isabella's Form Tutor, also attended the event.

Neighbourhood Watch

Securing you home: Peace of mind whilst you're away

Everyone needs a holiday, but we want you to come home and find everything as you left it. Almost half of all burglaries happen when a home is left empty. With the tips set out below you can help to make your home more secure while you are away.

- Make sure your home looks occupied. Ideally, ask a trusted neighbour or friend to look after it and to check for post and parcels on the doorstep or left protruding from the letterbox. Let them have a spare set of keys, but don't put your name or address on them.
- Don't leave your curtains closed during the daytime, as this shows the house is empty.
- Use automatic timer-switches to turn your lights on at dusk.
- Cancel any regular deliveries such as newspapers and milk.
- Cut the lawn before you go and trim back any plants that burglars could hide behind.
- Uncollected mail is a sign that you're away. The Royal Mail's 'Keepsafe' service will keep your mail for up to two months while you're away.
- Avoid putting your home address on your luggage when you are travelling to your holiday destination. Put this only on the inside of your cases.

- Make sure that you have up-to-date contents and buildings insurance.
- Keep tools and ladders locked away.
- If you're not leaving your car at home, ask a neighbour or a friend to park their car on your drive.
- Don't publish your absence on social media. Status updates, comments and photos can all give away that your home is empty.
- Is there a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme where you live? Visit **www.ourwatch.org.uk** and enter your postcode to check to see if there are any schemes set up in your area, or alternatively speak with us via our email address.
- Finally, don't forget to lock all external doors and windows. If you've got a burglar alarm, make sure it is set.

And before you set off, it's worth spending a couple minutes checking you've done all you had to do and taken everything you need with you. Don't forget your passport and tickets!

Aid for Ukraine

Volunteers visit Poland

A group of six volunteers from the Marlow and Maidenhead URC churches' Aid for Ukraine project travelled to Poland at the end of March this year.

The project had been supporting refugees from Ukraine arriving in Poland since the beginning of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, and the purpose of the visit was to see how the aid was rolled out, to see what else could be done to help and to help unload one of the lorries arriving in Poland which had been loaded three days earlier in Maidenhead.

At the beginning of the war, there were many thousands of refugees arriving daily, with very few possessions, little or no documentation and only the clothes they were wearing. Aid for Ukraine took on the task of supporting the local authorities and volunteers in Susiec, a small town about ten miles from the Polish/Ukrainian border, in south-eastern Poland.

The cultural centre in Susiec became the headquarters for coordinating help for the newly arrived refugees. Hundreds of volunteers were mobilised. Staff at the centre, led by the director, Johanna Kowalczuk, worked around the clock, providing aid to the new arrivals in the form of food, clothing, paperwork, bedding and shelter, as well as emotional support for families who had left loved ones behind. The volunteers, many from the police, fire brigade and ambulance teams, also had to be looked after. At one point, one thousand sandwiches were prepared each day to feed the arriving refugees and the volunteers.



The Aid for Ukraine volunteers were welcomed warmly by Johanna and her team at the community centre and were able to watch a presentation about the community's work at the height of the refugee crisis. Johanna was most grateful for the help and support that had arrived from Marlow and Maidenhead. The volunteers toured the kitchens and the food preparation areas as well as the offices.

Many of the items in the kitchens had been provided by the Meals from Marlow project, organised by Tom Kerridge and his volunteers.

It was good to see in real life what had only been seen in photos previously, and also that the equipment is now being used for community projects. It was both humbling and emotional for the volunteers to be thanked so often and so genuinely for the support and donations sent.

Aid for Ukraine works with Ewa's group to provide what is required, so it knows that what is sent is needed and useful and that the aid is going directly to people in need.

The Aid for Ukraine project has been sending lorries with donations to Poland since March 2022. The latest lorry was loaded with donations from Marlow and Maidenhead by volunteers from both churches in Maidenhead on Tuesday 28th March.

The visiting Aid for Ukraine volunteers were delighted to help unload this same lorry in Tomaszwów Lubelski on Friday 31st March. Because the stream of refugees arriving in Poland has tapered off, Aid for Ukraine changed its focus late summer last year from helping Ukrainians arriving in Poland to helping Ukrainians in Ukraine.

Headed up by an enthusiastic, energetic Polish lady, Ewa Piwko-Witkowska, a group of volunteers drives vans and cars into Ukraine to take much-needed supplies to villages, towns and hospitals, quite often putting themselves in danger.

Aid for Ukraine works with Ewa's group to provide what is required, so it knows that what is sent is needed and useful and that the aid is going directly to people in need.

The volunteers from Aid for Ukraine helped unload the truck into a small flat loaned to Ewa by the local council. From there the donations are sorted, sometimes repacked then loaded into smaller vans and cars to be delivered to various parts of Ukraine. Ewa herself drives into Ukraine every ten or twelve days.

Meeting Ewa was inspiring for the volunteers and helped them be even more determined to send aid where and when it is needed.

Visiting the area, the volunteers were impressed by the enormity of the task the Polish people had undertaken to help Ukraine in its hour of need. From council officials to local priests, from emergency services to local businesses, from hospitality workers to shop assistants, everyone gave help when asked, sometimes also without being asked. A lasting memory for the Aid for Ukraine volunteers will be a letter they each received on arrival from the hotel manager in Tomaszwów, thanking them for "helping our neighbours".
