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## **Town Council News**

Budget 2024-25 \_

The Budget was approved at Town Council on 23rd January.

We are pleased to present our budget for the fiscal year 2024/2025. The proposed budget not only sustains vital services for our residents but also continues a strong emphasis on financial control for 2024/2025, brought about by savings we have achieved in the current financial year.

Our focus on fiscal responsibility to mitigate an increased burden upon our residents ensures that once again we propose a zero-cost increase in the precept for our residents for 2024/2025.

While many councils continue to struggle to balance budgets, we will continue our commitment to protecting residents by continuing the process of organisational and systems modification to maintain a high level of service and minimise inflationary burdens.


Marlow Town is well positioned financially to meet its commitments and maintain the high quality of services for the residents

While our income in total is approximately £450,000 per annum, which sustains all local services for Marlow's 17,000+ residents, we are able to supplement that with additional revenue streams of circa £80,000 from investments and local service income. We're allocating this to support an exceptional level of local services, including the town bus, extensive private security patrols and enhancing the overall wellbeing of our community.

We continue our commitment to spending in the community with provisions of approximately £100,000, enabling us to continue with town events and community initiatives throughout the year. These bring residents together for civic occasions, Remembrance celebrations, Christmas events and national celebrations.

We continue to allocate employment costs of approximately £210,000 per annum and £20,000 as a proactive provision for this year's reorganisation review.

Devolved services will continue to be provided at a cost of £83,500 per annum for an external bespoke grass-

#### *Grants information and how to apply* \_

The Town Council has a budget of £8,000 for 2024-25 to distribute grants to community groups, charities and local organisations who benefit Marlow, its residents, visitors and the wider community.

Applications are considered at each meeting of the Resources Committee. All applications must be received three weeks prior to the date of the meeting to be considered for a grant.

#### Marlow cemetery \_

Marlow cemetery is situated in Wethered Road and is managed by Marlow Town Council. The cemetery has been in use since 1911 and many Marlow families' ancestors have been interred here.

When a grave is purchased, a "Grant of Exclusive Right of Burial" is granted to the registered grave owner. This gives them the exclusive rights to the grave for 99 years. All full graves have space for two full burial interments



and six ashes interments, and as Marlow cemetery is almost at capacity we urge residents to check to see if there is a grave space in the family that they could use for future family interments.

If families are unclear on who holds the "Grant of Exclusive Right for Burial" for a plot containing a relative, they may contact the Town Council office for assistance. Once the previous owner has been identified, families will need to agree who will have responsibility for it.

As Marlow cemetery is almost at capacity we urge residents to check to see if there is a grave space in the family that they could use for future family interments

Transfer of ownership of the "Exclusive Rights of Burial" can take place once the Town Council has received all the appropriate paperwork and fees.

bonded. The works are guaranteed for a minimum of eight years' use.

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## Charles Frohman Statue

#### Protection for the memorial monument on The Causeway

M arlow Town Council secures the future for grade II listed protection of the iconic Charles Frohman memorial monument on The Causeway.

The statue that depicts a nymph gazing toward the Thames was erected in 1924 to commemorate Charles Frohman, the renowned theatre producer who perished in the Lusitania sinking.

Frohman visited
England every summer from 1900, having a great affection for Marlow, regarding it as, "The most beautiful spot in the entire world", particularly appreciating the view from The Causeway over the bridge and the river to The Compleat Angler, where the statue now stands.




Sadly, the statue continues to suffer from the effects of the weather and is particularly vulnerable during the freeze thaw cycle that the winter brings, and steps now need to be taken to mitigate expensive future repairs and to preserve its longevity.

Mayor David Brown emphasised: "This is a powerful monument defining an 'Object of Culture', representing Buckinghamshire's young and old generation, through world war crisis, to the joy of youthfulness and new life and is important to everlasting hope as well as an important landmark for our residents."

On advice from conservators at Cliveden Conservation the specialised three-layer impermeable cover, which is not just a standard tarpaulin but a specialised windproof, waterproof, and insulating and breathable cover that shields the Grade II-listed sculpture by Leonard Stanford Merrifield FRBS will help us positively and proactively preserve this icon for generations to come.

The cover will be applied from November to February annually and will form part of an extensive cost-effective maintenance programme.

## **Bleed Kits**

#### Vital bleed kits now available in Marlow phone kiosks

arlow Town Council has purchased three bleed kits from the Daniel Baird Foundation.

The kits have been installed in all three of the Councilmanaged defibrillators housed in phone kiosks in Quoiting Square, Seymour Park Road and the junction of Station Road and Lock Road. The kits can be accessed by dialling 999 and using the code given to open the box.

"Each of these kits could save a life by controlling catastrophic bleeding," Marlow Mayor David Brown said. "We're pleased to be working with the Daniel Baird Foundation to improve safety on the streets of Marlow."

The Foundation aims to raise awareness of the importance of having publicly accessible bleeding control packs available. It works closely with local government organisations, community groups and business organisations to get vital bleed control kits into as many venues as possible.

## Change a child's life

With over 500 children in Buckinghamshire in need of caring, supportive homes, we are looking for foster carers to make sure that children in foster care don't need to move far away from their family and friends.

- clear and thorough ongoing training to help you feel prepared

- established and direct relationships with the children's social workers, allowing us to quickly respond to any questions you may have along your journey
- access to our fostering social events and support groups for you and your family







We have a growing fostering community in Marlow and its surrounds. Judith, one of our foster carers based in Marlow, shares her experience of fostering with Bucks: "As foster carers, we give children a bit of stability at an unsettling time for them. We also gain from having the children in our lives as they enhance it in ways we didn't expect. Fostering is not all plain sailing, but we roll with the punches!

"We are part of the fantastic Mockingbird initiative here in Marlow. Mockingbird brings together 8-10 fostering families who support each other. It allows the children we care for to be part of a bigger family and form friendships with others who share similar life experiences. John and I are home hub carers, so we can step in when needed.

"Having fostered with Bucks for over 15 years, I can honestly say that the training and support from the fostering team are excellent. We always feel appreciated for what we do."

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## Spring 'Green' Clean

We're Going Wild 2024

S pring and summer are the most active times of the year for both plants and people, which is why we need your help to keep our footpaths clear and help nature thrive in your garden.

During the spring and summer months, Buckinghamshire Council and MTC will be responsible for systematically clearing all footpath cut-throughs and coordinating maintenance activities. However, it is the responsibility of residents to ensure that vegetation from front and rear gardens do not obstruct these footpaths. This includes vegetation that crosses the boundary line at ground level, grows through a fence, or over a fence or a wall adjacent to the footpath.

Residents are encouraged to maintain their gardens by cutting back vegetation to the boundary line, ensuring it does not encroach onto the pavement throughout the year. This is especially important in the spring and summer months when our footpaths are the busiest.



Obstructed footpaths pose safety risks to residents of all ages and abilities. Overgrown vegetation can lead to trip hazards on the pavement surface and may also cause inconvenience or potential injury to pedestrians. It is particularly unsafe for individuals with prams, children, those with visual impairments, and people with disabilities who may have to divert or step into the road to avoid these obstacles.

#### *Maintenance guidelines*

To maintain the safety and accessibility of footpaths, we request that residents follow these guidelines:

**1. Regular maintenance:** Gardens should be regularly maintained, with vegetation cut back to the boundary line (next to, but not over, the pavement).



**2. Seasonal considerations:** Hedges and overgrowth that may house nesting birds should not be cut between April and October unless they pose a hazard to humans.

#### Footpath obstruction reporting\_

If you experience or see any footpath obstructions, please follow these steps:

- **Photo:** Take photos of the footpath obstruction and upload them to "Fix My Street".
- Responsibility: Buckinghamshire Council and MTC will determine who is responsible for the obstruction and decide on the appropriate course of action.
- Two weeks: If the responsibility falls on residents, they will be contacted, and they will have two weeks to remove the obstruction.
- Follow-up: After two weeks, an inspection will be conducted to ensure the obstruction is cleared. If it remains, further communication with the resident will occur
- Non-compliance: If the obstruction is not cleared within the two-week period and there is no future date set for resolution, no reasonable explanation for the delay, and no communication from the resident, the council will take the necessary steps to clear the obstruction. This is not the preferred course of action and may result in a remedial notice being issued by Buckinghamshire Council with the property owner liable for the costs.

All residents are encouraged to support the local community by cutting back their gardens every spring before the growing season begins and monitoring them throughout the summer to ensure clear, safe footpaths for everyone. If you have hedges or overgrowth that may house nesting birds, we ask that you please cut these back now to avoid any footpath obstacles during spring and summer. #### No Mow May - for one month, doing nothing does good \_

For the month of May, all non-essential areas MTC is responsible for cutting are left to grow wild to give naturally occurring plants and wildflowers a chance to grow, helping to feed and shelter vital pollinators (regular cutting will resume the beginning of June). Tear out your No Mow May sign and pop it in your window or put it on a stake in your garden. That way others can see and understand why your grass is long and what you are doing - because knowledge is contagious.

#### Why the long grass? \_

Long grass and wildflowers benefit wildlife, tackle pollution and trap carbon below ground. That's why we are expanding our wild verges to create a 'corridor' for pollinators to follow. This year we asked the schools to join our efforts - look on the map to see if your school is helping pollinators.

The transformation from grass to wild doesn't happen overnight. We must change how we cut the grass to reduce soil fertility, which discourages grass and encourages wildflowers.

1. Reduce the number of cuts per year: First year from eight to three cuts, second year two cuts, third year+

one cut.


- 2. Collect the grass clippings: Left clippings fertilise and grow more grass instead of wildflowers.
- 3. Keep the mower blade at 6cm: keeping the low wildflowers from being clipped.

The transformation from grass to wild doesn't happen overnight. We must change how we cut the grass to reduce soil fertility, which discourages grass and encourages wildflowers

#### There's no such thing as weeds in nature only plants

Sometimes there may be plants in the wrong place. When this happens MTC grounds maintenance and our grass-cutting contractor no longer use glyphosate (a powerful weedkiller); instead we use more nature-friendly methods.

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## Marlow Energy Group

Success for first greener home energy event



Arlow Energy Group's (MEG) first major public educational event about greener home energy was held on 18th November 2023 in the Shelley Theatre of Court Garden — and proved to be a great success.

The event was made possible by generous grants from Marlow Town Council and Buckinghamshire Council (South West Chilterns Community Board). Fourteen exhibitors drew in over 240 visitors from Marlow and beyond, prompting hundreds of conversations between experts and residents. In addition, five interesting talks were given by exhibitors in Court Garden's Eliot room.

MEG is confident that the show will have inspired and accelerated many individual actions to improve energy efficiency, to switch to electric heating and install domestic renewables. Decarbonising household energy is one of the toughest challenges of Britain's transition to Net Zero.

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## Releaf Marlow

#### Extending the green canopy

A busy winter planting season this year for Marlow's community trees group.

Local community group Releaf Marlow was out planting new trees again this winter, pursuing its mission to make Marlow and its surroundings better for both nature and people.

A highlight was the relaunch of the popular Free Family Trees scheme. Releaf Marlow distributed nearly 200 bare-root saplings to more than 75 local households, as well as to Marlow CoE Infant School. Participating residents could request up to three trees each from a choice of ten native species, including several smaller types suitable for gardens. This year's selection included hawthorn, bird cherry, pussy willow, crab apple and silver birch. Bare-root tree stock is only available each winter, while trees are dormant, and is much more economical to source than pot-grown trees.

Releaf Marlow also worked with Buckinghamshire Council to access central government funds for tree-planting projects agreed with landowners over the course of 2023. One of these involved inserting "standards" in a mature hedgerow abutting Marlow Valley Vineyard on Mundaydean Lane. Over time, these trees will add significant visual and nature value without interfering with how the land is managed.



Releaf Marlow also put several new ornamental trees into Gossmore Park in Marlow, replacing ones planted by the Environment Agency that had died.



At Harleyford Golf Course, the group revitalised a strip of decaying woodland between two fairways by planting new understory species including holly, hornbeam and hazel. It planted two new trees in the car park of Travelodge Hotel on Fieldhouse Lane.

The group is continuing its efforts to get more street trees planted in Marlow, and to improve survival rates of those planted

Releaf Marlow coordinator Nick Rowcliffe thanked all who have supported the initiative over the past year. This includes cooperative landowners and the volunteers who came out in winter weather to help plant trees. He also paid tribute to the Rotary Club of Marlow, which made a helpful donation to Releaf Marlow during 2023.

Meanwhile, the group is continuing its efforts to get more street trees planted in Marlow, and to improve survival rates of those planted.

Releaf Marlow is an initiative of Transition Town Marlow. The group welcomes suggestions for additional locations for trees and volunteers to help with planting and aftercare.

The Pond Project is near completion. Installing the decking for health and safety reasons is crucial, and we're delighted to say that Country Supplies have been generous, as have parents, carers and FreshScapes. Wild Marlow has been consulted and is supporting the clearing of the site before the installation begins.

The pond will become one of eight urban ponds in Marlow supporting the biodiversity projects of Marlow's eco-schools.

Recently it has been decided to create a fabulous piece of artwork to improve the aesthetics and well-being of the school community — an eco-mural. It will be an informative piece to help students connect with the natural world by highlighting ecosystems, biodiversity and environments. It will also show how the eco-system survives and thrives on the harmony between humans and the environment. The mural is to be designed by our enthusiastic art students, collaborating with local artist Dan Wilson from Wycombe Arts Centre, who has kindly offered to donate materials for the project.

In February, we took students to the Flowerland garden centre. The outing was joyous, as the choice of beautiful flowers and plants on offer is huge. Once again, Flowerland is thanked for its amazing support and contribution to our gardening endeavours.

Gaps in our hedges are to be filled in with trees donated by Marlow Rotary Club. This funding was facilitated by Head-Girl Mable Daw. Finally, we are delighted that we are on the Marlow Town Council 'Wild Verges' map; the grass will be kept long and trees will grow wild.

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## One Can Trust

#### Could you help make this year's fun-packed week a success?



The Covid lockdown days saw few positives but for the One Can Trust food bank, the incredible support from our local community was one. The plight of individuals and families, unable to work and make ends meet, was brought to the forefront of people's minds by national and local news and we gratefully saw a huge rise in donations as demand on our service increased three-fold.

Many local residents, particularly children, became Street Heroes and collected food from friends and neighbours before dropping the donations to our warehouse in Duke Street, behind the train station. To this day, our incredible Street Heroes, identified by the yellow boards outside their homes, generate 15% of all donated food. We are hugely grateful for their continued efforts.

Along with all the team at One Can, I'd hoped and expected demand to reduce following the pandemic but with the cost-of-living crisis, sadly the numbers of supported families and individuals has remained alarmingly high – over 600 a week, 45% of which being children. In the final quarter of 2023, we spent, on average, £13K a month on food to bridge the gap between donations and demand; the money being received from Bucks Council, local grant funders, businesses and individual donations.

Thank you to everyone who donates to us. Community support is as vital as ever – we simply couldn't manage without it and neither would the families we support, many of whom are often at breaking point.

Another incredibly important source of food is generated from our weekend supermarket food drives where you might see our volunteers, proudly wearing their yellow branded One Can Trust T-shirts, encouraging customer donations. We can be found at Marlow Sainsbury's on the first Saturday and Sunday of every month.

I am so very proud of our charity and how it has grown to support people in their hour of need. From the volunteer calls made by our Community Support team, reaching out to clients and signposting to extra help, to the children's clothes bank held at the Wesley Church in High Wycombe and to the cookery classes at Hills Café in Micklefield. None of this would be possible if it were not for our amazing and selfless volunteer team – our charity's lifeline.

## Past & Present

#### Marlow Ice Age

The previous 'Marlovian' Magazine included old photographs of the severe flooding in Marlow, late 1894. A few weeks further on came the 'Big Freeze' and here, as promised, are some relevant pictures. However, similar to Ernest Udy's signed photographs of the floods, these are in equally poor condition.

I had always thought that these might also be the work of Mr Udy, who lived in Claremont Gardens, but removing one from its frame for the first time ever I discovered the name of C.Hughes and the caption inserted above.

Without wishing to get involved in discussions about global warming, there is no doubt that winters in past centuries were considerably colder than today, and also lasted longer. The London Thames freezing right across was a regular occurrence, and 'Frost Fairs' on the ice attracted huge crowds and various attractions.

Here in Marlow, the last time the river froze right across was, as seen below, early 1895. I am sure that these days we would be reluctant to take our lives in our hands, as did these brave (or possibly foolhardy) Victorians, especially (amazingly!) the lady with her young child in the pram. The photograph in the poorest condition, lower right, includes a tricycle and a dog if you look carefully.

Up river at Oxford, where the Thames / Isis is a little narrower, there is a picture, possibly by Henry Taunt, in better condition than the below, depicting a stagecoach, passengers, and two horses on the ice.

1963 was the last really bad winter experienced in Marlow. Snow started to fall on Boxing Day 1962 and continued heavily through the following week. It did not completely thaw until late March. The Thames partially froze over, although a strong and fast flowing stream kept the centre free of ice. I doubt if too many locals tried to emulate the scenes of 1895.

In three of the below a tall mast or flagpole is visible next to 'Rye Peck', the house which still adjoins Tierney Court. This pole is assumed to have connections with Shaw's Boathouses, but has disappeared in pictures from the early 1900s. Alongside is the elegant 'Sunnybank', these days replaced by the slightly less elegant 'Dunstable House'.

By the time you read this we will hopefully be into spring, and I wish you a good summer, and perhaps a bit better than 2023.






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
