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



As part of its vision to be the most attractive and vibrant riverside town in the Thames Valley, Marlow Town Council has installed over one hundred hanging baskets in the High Street, Spittal Street, West Street and around the Wiltshire Road roundabout, creating a beautiful display.

#### Defibrillator list in Marlow \_\_\_\_\_

Here is a list of the locations of the defibrillators in Marlow. If you need to use a defibrillator, phone 999 and you will be given the code to open the box. The machine, when turned on, will talk you through what to do. You don't need any training to use one - just call 999.

- Marlow Medical Doctors. The Doctor's House. Victoria Road.
- Higginson Park near the Cafe on the wall outside the public toilets. The nearest park entrance is the corner of Pound Lane and Marlow High Street
- Court Garden Sports Complex in Pound Lane.

### Become A Councillor

Would you like to be a councillor?

ould you like to serve your community, influence local decision-making and really make a difference? If so, why not consider standing as a councillor in the May 2025 local elections?

There are roughly 20,000 town or parish councillors in England. Councillors are elected every four years to the local council to represent their local community, so they must either live or work in the area.

The role offers the chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life of people in your local area. Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work. Councillors have to balance the needs and interests of residents, the political party they represent (if any) and the council.

The chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life of people in your local area.

The councillor's role centres around community leadership and engagement. Responsibilities include:

- Representing the ward for which they are elected.
- Decision-making, developing and reviewing council
- Scrutinising decisions taken by the councillors.
- Regulatory, quasi-judicial and statutory duties.

How can I get involved?

Once you've decided to get involved and stand as a councillor there are two main routes: you can decide to stand for one of the political parties/groups or as an independent.

Representing a political party.

If you want to represent a political party, then get involved with your party locally as soon as possible. They will advise on what is involved and ultimately select a candidate.

Standing as an independent candidate \_\_\_\_

If you're thinking of standing as an independent candidate, you can contact your council's electoral services department. You will need to become aware of



issues in your local area; what your local council is doing about these issues; and how your own opinion differs from that of the political parties.

#### *Getting officially nominated*

Whether you've been selected by a party or are standing as an independent candidate, you must make sure that you are officially nominated as the election date draws nearer. This means getting 10 people to sign your nomination papers which are available from Buckinghamshire Council's electoral services department. Signatories must be registered electors in the ward where you wish to stand.

You must also give your consent in writing to your nomination. All the necessary documents must be submitted no later than 19 working days before the day of the election.


Keeping footpaths clear for walking is in residents' hands


It's the height of summer and luckily, we have had less rain and more sun lately which means more people are out and about walking around our beautiful town. Unfortunately, many of these walking journeys by residents and visitors haven't been as enjoyable, or safe, as they should be due to overgrown gardens spilling onto public footpaths.

Vegetation obstructions whether ivy growing over the pavement or plants growing through a fence or over a wall all reduce the physical walking space and make it less safe to use certain footpaths in front of or behind homes. These obstructions may seem like small and inconsequential inconveniences, but they are all safety risks.

We ask all residents with a property bordering a public footpath to walk on the footpath and see if any of their garden growth is obstructing the usage.

Obstructions growing on top of pavements can be a trip hazard for walkers and can tangle around pram and scooter wheels causing an accident. Vegetation growing through a fence or over a wall may not touch





It is every resident's civic responsibility to cut-back their gardens regularly throughout the year to ensure the public footpaths next to their property are safe. We ask all residents with a property bordering a public footpath to walk on the footpath and see if any of their garden growth is obstructing the usage. If there are any obstructions, we ask that you please cut them back now to the boundary line (which starts at the edge of the pavement and is a vertical line going up). If you have a hedge, please listen and check for nesting birds before cutting – if there are birds please wait until autumn to cut back the hedge.

If you are out walking and come across footpaths where you are forced to physically avoid while on a pavement that doesn't border your property, please follow these steps below.

Footpath obstruction reporting:

#### Photo

Take photos of the footpath obstruction and upload them to "Fix My Street".

#### Responsibility

Buckinghamshire Council and MTC will determine who is responsible for the obstruction and decide on the appropriate course of action.

#### Two weeks

If the responsibility falls on residents, they will be contacted, and they will have two weeks to remove the obstruction.

#### • Follow-up

After two weeks, an inspection will be conducted to ensure the obstruction is cleared. If it remains, further communication with the resident will occur.

#### • Non-compliance

If the obstruction is not cleared within the two-week period and there is no future date set for resolution, no reasonable explanation for the delay, and no communication from the resident, the council will take the necessary steps to clear the obstruction. This is not the preferred course of action and may result in a remedial notice being issued by Buckinghamshire Council with the property owner liable for the costs.

## Who Does What?

### Who looks after you in Marlow?

o you know which council empties your dustbins, runs the Marlow Library, owns our allotments, repairs broken lights, owns and runs our cemetery and chapel, or is responsible for Higginson Park?

We know it can be confusing. It's not always easy to find out who is responsible for what, which can sometimes be frustrating. The information below is designed to point you in the right direction.

The Marlow Town Council office will always try and help you with your initial queries and put you on the right path, even if we can't help directly. We all work together to ensure the best for the residents of Marlow.

- Trading Standards
- Transport for Bucks, highways, pavements, street lighting
- Highways and public footpath repair and maintenance
- Social care, adult and children's services
- Schools
- Libraries
- Household waste sites
- Higginson Park upkeep and maintenance
- Court Garden Leisure Centre
- Car parks Court Garden, Dean Street, Institute Road, Liston Road, Riley Road, Gossmore Recreation
- Planning applications and building controls
- Environmental health
- Street trading
- Street name signs
- CCTV
- Public toilets and litter bins
- Bin collection and pest control

They have a range of online tools to report problems. You can report potholes, problems with street lighting, highways issues, and issues and complaints regarding public transport. Marlow wins Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village Michaelis Cup

M arlow has been awarded the Buckinghamshire
Best Kept Village Michaelis Cup in the small towns category of the annual competition. The judging, which took place in early June, evaluated various aspects such as green spaces, children's play areas, floral displays, the cemetery, war memorial, nature conservation areas and community engagement.

### Marlow received an impressive 192 points out of a possible 200

The judging panel praised the town's hanging basket displays, the tidiness of the Cemetery, and the maintenance of The Causeway and War Memorial.

The competition, based in Buckinghamshire and held annually between June and July, was established in 1957 by Sir Francis Dashwood and the Local Councils' Association. It aims to encourage community collaboration across all age groups to enhance the attractiveness of villages and towns for both residents and visitors.

The Leader of Marlow Town Council, Cllr Chris Funnell stated, "We are proud of this success and see it as a foundation for addressing greater challenges, such as environmental issues. This recognition motivates us to continue improving our community and we would like to thank the council team, community groups and residents for their dedication and support of our entry. "





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# Royal Swan Upping

Mayor joins Swan Uppers on the Thames in Marlow

This summer's Royal Swan Upping took place on Tuesday, 16th July, with the vibrant red outfits of the Swan Uppers providing a colourful sight for walkers along the Thames towpath.

Marlow's Mayor David Brown accompanied the Swan Uppers on the river from Marlow to Cookham and a return to Marlow, where he held a reception at the Two Brewers pub. "I was delighted to be part of this traditional event," he said. "The Swan Uppers ringed cygnets between Cookham and Marlow as part of the process of checking on the health of swans and cygnets on behalf of His Majesty, the King."

Swan Upping is an important event in the calendar each year. It plays a crucial role in the conservation of the mute swan and involves the King's Swan Warden collecting data, assessing the health of young cygnets and examining them for any injuries. Cygnets are extremely vulnerable at this early stage in their development and Swan Upping provides an opportunity to help both adults and cygnets that might otherwise go untreated. Swan

Upping 2024 commenced on July 15th from Sunbury lock and finished at Abingdon on Thames on Friday, 19th

According to the Swan Marker, last year saw a considerable downturn in cygnet numbers due to the loss of many breeding pairs during the outbreak of Avian Influenza. "So far this year we have received very few reports of Avian Influenza cases within the swan population in the Thames Valley," David Barber said. "This is very positive; however, the swans are contending with very high water levels and strong streams due to the widespread flooding that has washed many nests away. In some cases, the swans may rebuild their nests, which could result in a late breeding season this year."

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# Neighbourhood Watch

Do you live in an Easy Street?

B urglars are often opportunistic thieves who prey on houses and flats. They seek out any opening that they can take advantage of, specifically doors and windows that are left open or unlocked or are easy to force

- Point of entry is gained by burglars using ladders, garden furniture or drainpipes to get on top of flat roofs.
- They will then enter through a bedroom window to gain access to the upstairs of the property.
- Jewellery seems to be the main target; however all valuables are at risk, especially if easy to grab and go.
- The best advice is to take preventative measures to minimise the chances of becoming a victim.
- Lower fences at the front around one metre high are preferable to high fences as they allow for a clear view over the top and don't provide cover for anyone wishing to hide.
- At the rear and sides, taller fencing is recommended to prevent easy access.
- Trellis, thorny plants, or a suitable anti-climb topping such as plastic spikes make it difficult for anyone climbing over a fence or gate.
- Gravel driveways and paths will make sure you hear anyone approach.





Distraction burglars will pretend to be someone they are not, so it's important you are aware of the common methods they use to get you to let them into your property.

 Pretending to be from a care agency, the council or a utility company investigating a gas or water leak.

If you open the door, put the chain on first, always ask for ID and check it with the company before letting somebody into your home

- Seeking help to leave a note for a neighbour or even asking for a drink of water if they claim to be thirsty or unwell.
- Claiming to be in a hurry or emergency and needing to get into your home quickly.
- Working in teams, with one person distracting you while the other searches your home.

If you open the door, put the chain on first, always ask for ID and check it with the company before letting somebody into your home. Use the phone number advertised in the phone book or online, as the number on their identity card could be fake. For a utility company, call the customer service department. Close the door while you do this.

If you feel threatened or in danger by the presence of the caller, call **999**.





# History Of Marlow

bout 10 years ago, in the Marlow Free Press, All reproduced some crudely drawn maps and illustrations proposing a Marlow Bypass to the north of the Town Centre and the pedestrianisation and closure to all traffic of West Street, Spittal Street (they spell it Spital) and two thirds of the High Street, the latter to have flower beds in the centre. All this some years before the bypass we have now, and when the Rookery site remained undeveloped. Portlands Alley was to be widened to be a part of the bypass. Some readers thought it was my April Fool's joke, being around that date: the upheaval, the years of construction and the demolition of much housing seemed ridiculous. I have now obtained a more official folder dated February 1965 and published by the Departments of Architecture, Planning and Highways for Buckinghamshire confirming the plans. Pencilled on the cover is 'J.D.H 30.3.65'. I wonder if that might have been Councillor John Hester. And what the Town Council thought of the scheme - the final decision was not, apparently, in their hands. Other towns have found pedestrianisation of main streets has been a mistake. I think we can all give thanks that this never happened! Michael Eagleton



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


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
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
